A CHAMPION RECRUITER.

Sergt.-Major Fuller of Toronto Has Secured Nearly 4,000 Men.

Did you ever know a man who had been a soldier all his life, who has been wounded and given up for dead by medical men, who has gone through various years of hardship and queer experiences, and who still does not fancy that his life has been one of romance? asks a writer in The Toronto Star. Just such a man has been found in this city. He is Sergt.-Major Stanley Fuller, who has identified himself with the 204th Battalion as a recruiter, and who, at the same time, claims the record for securing the most recruits for any man in the country. Sergt. Fuller has been working as a recruiter ever since the war broke out, he has been using all the experience gained by his twenty years of soldiering, and with the wiles thus learned he makes the proud claim of having personally secured the enlistment of between three and four thousand men.

The record is an astonishing one, but when it comes to talking the advantages of being a soldier Sergt. Fuller knows all the ropes. When the war broke out he went with the 36th Peel Regiment as a recruiter, and during the next seven months was connected with ten battalions. Later he was transferred to Lindsay, where he claims to have personally brought into the ranks at least 500 men of the 108th Battalion. When he came back to this city he became connected with the Beaver Battalion and is doing the work.

His personal history is an interesting one. Since the age of sixteen he has not been wearing a uniform for the King. He comes of a large family of soldiers, the Fullers of Minster, near Ramsgate, Kent—a family so soldierly that when he was still fifteen years of age his mother had won a special medal from the King for the greatest number of soldier sons sent into the army from any Kent family. That brings out the interesting fact that there are fourteen brothers, every one of whom has, at some time or other, been in the Imperial army. At present nine of the brothers are on active service, while the whole family representation in the ranks, including near relatives, runs over fifty. Just to show that the family has high ideals, every one of the fourteen brothers has been named after earls and dukes and men famed in the annals of history.

Coming down to Sergt. Fuller's own experience, he enlisted with the Chatham Engineers at the age of 16, and was with that branch of the service for six years before joining the Garrison Artillery. It was during the fourteen years with the latter branch that he had all his troubles. First, he was on board the Eutopia, the transport which sank off Gibraltar with the loss of 350 soldiers. Then, while handling a gun at Gibraltar a handspike was driven nearly through his body. When the South African War broke out, Sergt. Fuller's branch was sent into the active fighting, and he weathered that all right until he got as far as Swartz Kop. There a bullet caught him through the abdomen, and put him out of service for some months. When he rejoined his unit, Sergt. Fuller was just in time to take part in the famed battle of Colenso, and then was so badly injured by shrapnel that literally a new front for his body had to be built of silver plates and borrowed flesh.

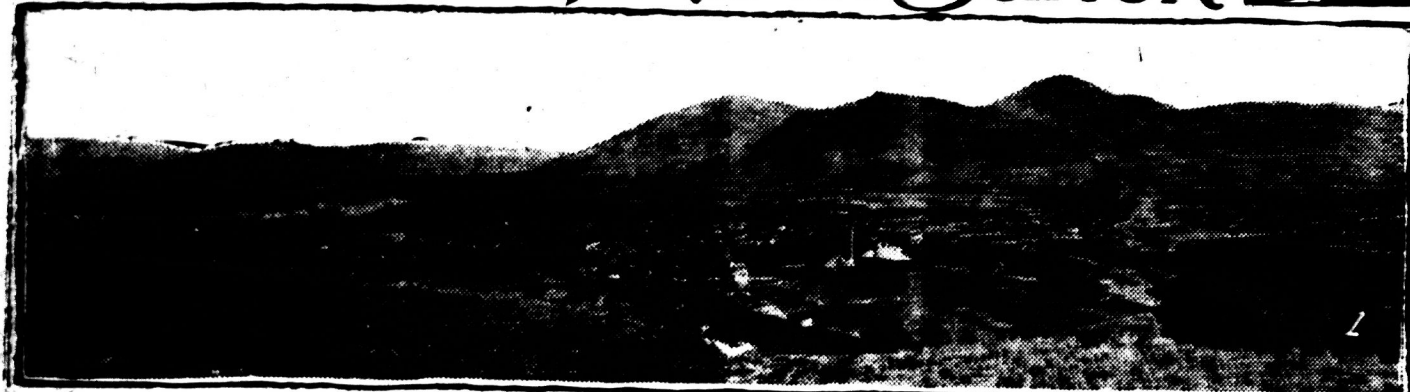

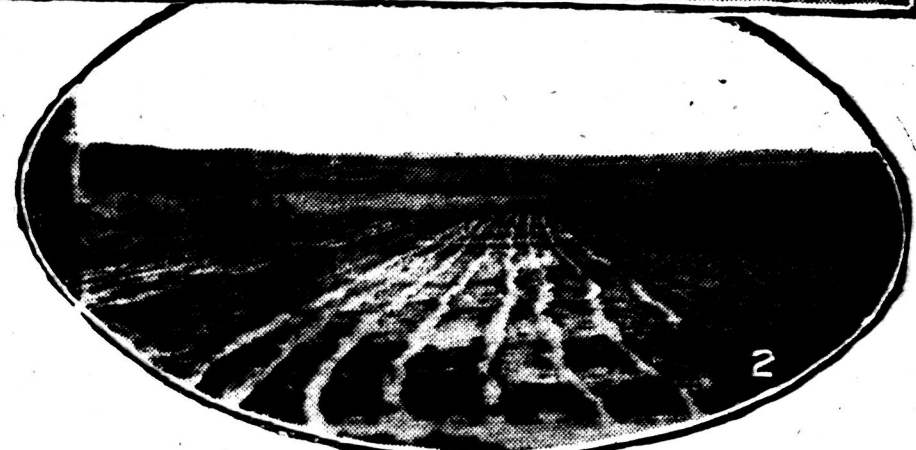
Kamloops AND Irrigation

THE Western Canada Irrigation Association held its Tenth Annual Convention at the City of Kamloops the last week in July. The picturesque little city takes its name from the Indian equivalent "Meeting of the Waters," where the sun shines every day and good fellowship, health and happiness radiate from all, and open wide in hospitality its doors to you. Away back over a hundred years ago, the North West Fur Trading Co., with keen appreciation of the advantages of the location, established a post on the present site of Kamloops—the junction of the now united North and South Thompson Rivers. Its excellent water communication; its central position in a wide open stretch of splendid grazing country and its healthy, growing climate, attracted Indians and traders from all parts, and soon the little trading-post grew in importance and population. Seventy-five years afterwards the Canadian Pacific Railway thrust its steel rails through the main street of the thriving little community, and it was but an endorsement of the location of the old trading company, that Kamloops was indeed, "The Place in the Sun."

Sock Knitting.

The following note on How to finish off the toe of socks being knitted for the soldiers by the ladies of the Haldimand Sock Batt. will be of interest to the workers and satisfaction to the Committee in charge.

TOE—Divide the 60 stitches between the three needles, 23 on each.

1st row—Knit together 1st and 2nd stitches on each needle.

2nd row—Knit together 2nd and 3rd stitches on each needle.

3rd row—Knit together 3rd and 4th stitches on each needle.

And so on, beginning again with 1st and 2nd stitches on each needle. Decrease to nine stitches. Draw wool through stitches, and darn in carefully.
