In the death of Capt. Alderson, which occurred in Toronto on Monday, July 31, another pioneer has joined the silent majority.

Captain Alderson spent the early part of his life in Summerville, Peel County. After four years at College, near Albany, N.Y., he joined the Governor-General's body guard, serving under Col. Denison in the Fenian Raid in 1868. Later he attended the Military School and obtained his commission of lieutenant and after wards a captaincy.

Mr. Alderson also held his certificate for steamship captain and for several years ran his own excursions and freight boats out of Port Dover where he became well known.

For some years he worked the old homestead at Summerville, after which he moved to Toronto, where he has resided for the past nine years.

He leaves a widow and one daughter to mourn his loss, besides a host of friends in the different places where he has resided.

The funeral took place from the G.T.R. station, Jarvis, at 10.50 a.m., Aug. 2nd, to the Methodist Church cemetery for interment.

Sugar in Simcoe and London

Simcoe, August, 9th, 1916.
Dear Editor—The writer has often thought that prices in Simcoe were higher than other places, and while reading a London paper this morning had this theory definitely proved. Last week inquiries were made of two grocers in town as to the price of sugar per hundredweight: \$9.00 was the quotation given. The item contained in the London paper reads: "On Monday afternoon at 3.12 the price of all grades of sugar was reduced 20 cents on a hundred, making the second reduction in two weeks. The first drop came on July 31 of 20 cents a hundred, and last week sugar retailed at \$8.10 per hundred. The price is now \$7.90 per cwt."

Last week Londoners paid \$8.10 for sugar, and housewives in Simcoe paid \$9.00. Simcoe is a charming place in which to live, but it is too bad that residents here have to pay so much for the privilege of dwelling here. If one commodity is so much higher there must be many others, and the grocers in Simcoe must be waxing wealthy very rapidly. No wonder Simcoe can boast of 14 groceries, which seems a large number for a population of 4000. If the grocers have any case, let's hear from them.
