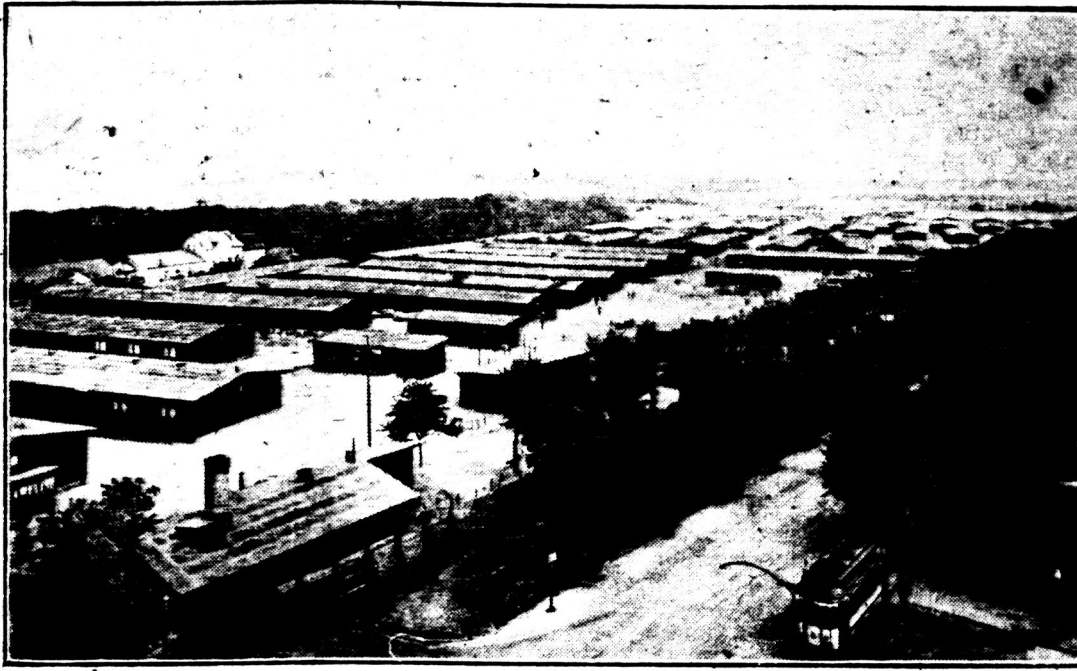
The infant child of Mr. and Mrs.

Secord left for overseas with the First Contingent and was made a prisoner in one of those early battles which have made Canadians famous. The house with the crosses on it is where he is quartered.

## Monster Demonstration

A monster demonstration will be held  
on the farm of Geo. Hopper, Springvale,  
on Friday, August 25th, at 1.30 p.m.  
A traction ditcher will be in operation  
during the afternoon. The expert, operat-  
ing the ditcher, will illustrate the  
methods of digging and to the grading  
and regulating the depth for the laying  
of tile. The ditcher will be kept in op-  
eration so that all may see it work.  
The tile will be laid in the drain and in-  
structions given as to the making of the  
joints and the joining of the laterals with  
the main drains, also the size of tile to  
use and the soil covering.

G. L. Wolz, Dept. of Agriculture, Cayuga,  
will, during the afternoon, deliver  
an address on Underdrainage, and will  
take up the subject in all its different  
phases. Underdrainage means earlier  
and heavier crops and an increase of  
farm values. The scarcity of labor is  
today the main hindrance to Under-  
drainage and the use of the ditching  
machine overcomes it. Come to the  
demonstration and see.

## To Mail Carriers

The rural mail carriers find that  
many boxes on their routes. If you  
miss your mail to-day or to-morrow  
don't blame the carrier. First look  
at your mail box and see if your  
name is distinctly printed on both  
sides. A new man occasionally goes  
the rounds, and if then names are not  
seen he has no way of knowing and  
invariably passes by. The mail is  
then brought back and lies at the  
distributing point until the next day.  
All those having rural mail boxes  
should therefore see that their names  
appear prominently on the boxes.  
Besides, it is pleasant when town  
people or when country people are  
in unfamiliar neighborhoods, to know  
the homes of the acquaintances.—Sim-

## Re Price of Sugar

In last week's issue the Record pub-  
lished an extract from the "Letter  
Box" of the Simcoe Reformer regard-  
ing a consumer's views on the price  
of sugar. Some of the merchants of  
our own town did not think that the  
said piece was justiciable to the re-  
tailers, and as there is always two  
sides to a question, the following is  
the answer of the Simcoe grocers.

To the Editor of The Reformer—

Dear Sir,—In your last week's  
issue, August 10th, I notice a com-  
munication signed "Victim," re price  
of sugar and I consider this too ser-  
ious a charge against Simcoe grocers  
to let it go unanswered. At the time  
that Victim claimed sugar to be sell-  
ing at retail at \$7.90 in London it  
was costing Simcoe grocers \$8.26 (aid  
down in their warehouses. All sugar  
is now selling on a Montreal basis,  
on an equalized freight rate plan, at  
Guild prices, and is supposed to cost  
every grocer alike, excepting where-  
there is a competitive point with a  
jobbing or wholesale house, then the  
grocers of that city buy a few cents  
per hundred less, but not enough less  
to allow it to be sold at seven 99-100,  
in any city unless sold at a loss.  
Selling sugar that cost \$8.26 at \$9.00  
allows a grocer 9 2-9 per cent pro-  
fit, while most grocers have an ex-  
pense to contend with running from  
51 to 17 per cent, which means an  
actual loss on every sack of sugar  
sold. I am only speaking of standard  
Reugar, such as Redpath or St. Law-  
rence, the only two sugars I ever  
handled. The old brands I am not in  
a position to talk about. There are  
some sixteen handling groceries in  
Simcoe, instead of fourteen, as stated  
by "Victim."
