It will be news to many that a newspaper known as the Globe was published in Toronto before the paper founded by Hon. George Brown was established in 1844. Mr. Chas. E. Bright, of Brampton, has in his possession a copy of the Globe dated Toronto, May 2, 1850, and labeled Vol. 1, No. 6. How long that paper continued publication Mr. Bright is unable to say, though it was published by his great-grandfather, John Carey. The contents of this four-page weekly are interesting, and even historical. Several columns are taken up with a speech by Lord John Russell in the British House of Commons, discussing the necessity of Upper and Lower Canada. One of the advertisers is H. Piper, whose firm has continued to the present, and one of the articles he offers for sale is "still worms" which apparently were part of the equipment of distilleries, which then abounded in the country—Prin. & Pub.

Gentlemen—We your Home Committee beg leave to submit the following report. There are at present thirty-three inmates in the Home, twenty-one males and twelve females, an increase of two since our last report. We sold the hay on the Jacob Starnaman farm to John Link for ten dollars and second crop for two dollars to William Link making a total of twelve dollars.
We have carefully examined the accounts of the different accounts for maintenance compared them with the accounts and find them correct. We would refer the same to the Finance Committee for payment.

REPORT OF THE PRINTING AND INSURANCE COMMITTEE

Cayuga, Aug. 15th, 1916.
To the Warden and Members of the County Council.
Gentlemen—We your Committee on insurance and printing beg leave to report as follows: that we insured in following buildings and contents in the Mercantile Insurance Company (J. W. Sheppard, agent) that is to say:
On Coal and residence and barn \$20800.00 to expire on the 17th day of July, 1919.
On furniture, House of Refuge and out buildings \$3700.00 to expire on the 1st day of July, 1919.
On Registry Office Building \$2600.00 to expire on the 12th day of July, 1919.
The premium on the above amount was \$405.25 when we asked the Finance Committee to confirm already paid, also \$400.00 on House of Refuge insured in the Phoenix of Hartford, John J. Cleary agent, Danville, to expire 21th day of June, 1919, the premium \$90.00 we would recommend to Finance Committee for payment.

We your Building Committee beg leave to report as follows:
We have examined all repairs on Court House and find them very satisfactory. A. M. Lymburner accounts for materials furnished and work on Judge's chamber and Law Library \$88.25; Murray Hardware Cayuga, furnished Judge's chamber one chandelier and light and lamps complete and installing, amt. \$10.00; W. H. Wild, w.k. on Judge's room, wall paper, burrap, moulding, \$3.60; Paints, varnishes, and glass, \$11.25; glass for doors, with letters \$12.50; glass for windows, work glazing, putting, glass indoors, asphaltine hall \$71.35; total \$8151.00.
Also the account of Baird Bros., Cayuga for work and supplies on Court House \$75.39.
William Johnson for drawing one load of sand to be used for pointing up walls on Court House \$84.00.
James Reid, mason, for pointing up walls on Court House, five days, at \$2.50 per day, \$12.50.
Also A. Hannah for lath furnished in Judge's room \$3.35, plaster \$4.00, lime \$1.80, carting \$1.50, labor \$26.10, plaster paper \$51.50; total amount \$38.55.
And that the above accounts have been certified and corrected and would recommend them to the Finance Committee for payment.
We would also recommend a grant of \$100.00 for furniture in Judge's rooms.
We would recommend that one book case from Grand Jury Room be moved to Treasury Room and that the Treasurer be authorized to have said change made.
