We clip the following from the John O' Great Journal of Oct. 20th:

"Official intimation has been received by his relatives of the death in action on the 6th inst. of Pte. Geo. Banks Mason, Canadians, youngest son of Mr. Sinclair Mason, Union St., Wick and late of Gilles Canistry. Pte. Mason, prior to enlistment, was employed in Winnipeg, Canada, to which country he emigrated nine years ago. He enlisted in August, 1915, and came over with the Canadians. He had been at the front about eight months prior to his death. Pte. Mason is survived by a wife and one child who reside at Winnipeg. In the Canisbay district he was a general favorite and exceedingly popular and his death will be learnt of with deepest regret."

Pte. Mason was well and favorably known here having been employed on various farms in this locality before going to Winnipeg. He was a member of King Solomon Lodge A.F. & A.M. and Court Jarvis, I.O.F.

Killed in Action

Word was received to-day that Pte. Chris. Walker, son of Mrs. Ellen Walker of this place, was killed in action on Nov. 18.

Chris, as he was commonly called, enlisted at Brantford, and left for overseas last spring. He has been in the trenches since summer and has seen numerous scraps.

This is the first of the Jarvis Home Boys to be killed and his surviving mother has the deepest sympathy of the community. Further particulars are unavailable at time of going to press.

Memorial Service

WILLIAM J. LOWN

On Sunday morning, November 26th, last, a Memorial Service was held in Christ Church, Nanticoke, for the late Pte. William J. Lown, late of Pt. Dover, who recently died at Bramshot Camp, Eng., the preacher being the Rector, The Rev. Henry W. A. Brand who took for his text the words "Now no chastening for the present seemeth to be joyous, but grievous; nevertheless afterward it yieldeth the peaceful fruit of righteousness unto them which are exercised thereby." Hebrews 12, verse 11. In the course of the course of the sermon stress was laid upon the fact that God doth not willingly afflict the children of Men as though He delighted in meeting out punishment, but rather that His chastenings of love for our correction. In the course of his remarks the preacher said, "The natural heart would recoil from the chastenings of God, but the soul that knoweth the goodness of the Lord, meekly bowing beneath his affliction, would in due time emerge joyfully triumphant from out of the experience. God knows how hard the lot of the afflicted is, yet He would have us endure hardness—the hardness of seeming disappointment of our hope and other things—as good soldiers of Jesus Christ. Equipped as soldiers for the fray we are to fight our way through the clouds of sorrow as we encounter them, led through the darkness by the Captain of our Salvation who shall light up our way before us." After dealing with some of the evident purposes of Divine Chastening the preacher concluded his discourse with the following reference to him in whose memory the service was held.

"We are gathered to-day to honor the memory of one, Wm. J. Lown, who at the call of Britain in the hour of our empire need, enlisted that he might bear his part in the great fight for freedom. After a period of training, intercepted by sickness, where while awaiting his call to the front, he was again stricken down, and to the sorrow of his parents, friends, and comrades-in-arms, he was called upon to lay down his life before ever he had met the foe he had gone to fight. Our hope is that he rests in peace. The perplexing probability of this life will no more present themselves to him for solution. They, for him, are solved. He has died in the service of his country, as truly as the soldier stricken on the battlefield. To uphold his country's honor he has given his life. The sacrifice is, we believe not in vain. May the God of peace comfort the hearts of all who mourn his loss and enable us all with unrestrained will to say "Thy will be done." The passing lives of those who thus give up their lives as a sacrifice on the altar of their country is a call to us who are left behind to be up and doing, doing with a greater determination than ever, all that in us lies to save our empire and restore the rights and privileges of those nations which are oppressed by a merciless foe." At the close of the service Miss Eva Thompson rendered very fitting the beautiful and appropriate sacred solo "Does Jesus Care?" The church was draped for the occasion, and two Canadian flags were displayed, one hanging on each side of the chancel. A large and sympathetic congregation filled the church. The mourners present were J. and Mrs. Lown (father and mother of deceased), J. Davis, Mrs. M. Davis and children, R. Davis.

BRIEF BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

William J. Lown was born in the city of Toronto on the 19th of July, 1893. He was educated at Port Dover High School and later graduated from the Elliott Business College, Toronto. He enlisted at the beginning of December, 1915, in the 123rd Battalion, Royal Grenadiers, in Toronto, and was in training in that city until the early part of May, 1916, when he went with his Battalion to Niagara Camp. He left Niagara with his Battalion for Overseas on the 27th July, 1916, and arrived in Amherst, Nova Scotia on the 31st July, 1916. While in the barracks there he contracted measles, and was sent to the Amherst Hospital where he was quarantined until the 14th of August, 1916, when he left for Halifax, Nova Scotia, and was billeted at the Wellington barracks there to await transportation overseas. He sailed from Halifax on September 26th last on board the transport S. S. Corsican. Arriving in England on Oct. 7, he joined his battalion camp where later he was seized with pneumonia and died on November 11 last in the Military Hospital at that Camp.

Major E. P. Stown writing from Godalming, Surrey, Eng., to Pte. Lown's mother concerning her son, who was in his Company, says, "On behalf of the officers and other ranks of the Company, I desire to convey to you their deep sympathy with you in your heavy loss, a loss which I hope will be lightened by the thought that he died in the service of his country quite as much as if he had been killed in action. He is buried in the Anglican Cemetery of Millford Parish, beautiful situated on the Haslemere road, about a mile from here, and the battalion will

Sad Death

A gloom was cast over this section on Saturday night when the news came that Mr. E. B. MacDonald, a well known farmer of Walpole, had died suddenly while on his way home from the village.

Deceased who was proceeding homeward on foot was picked up by Mr. George Hoskins near the home of Mr. J. C. Ross. He was but a few minutes in Mr. Hoskins' buggy when the end came.

He was born in the vicinity of Toronto fifty-six years ago the greater part of his life however, was spent in Haldimand County where he was widely known as a public spirited citizen.

During the past twenty-four years he was a valued member of the Board of Directors of the Walpole Farmers' Mutual Fire Insurance Company, part of the time as Vice president, and later becoming president of the Board.

All matters relating to the social and economic betterment of the community in which he lived were assured of his sympathy and support. He leaves to mourn his untimely demise, a widow, three sons, John A. and Emerson, of Worcester, Mass., U.S.A., Dr. Roy with the Army Medical Corps in Mesopotamia, and one daughter, Annie, of the public school staff, St. Catharines.

On Tuesday, the 5th inst., a largely attended funeral service was conducted in Knox Church, Jarvis, by the Rev. A. W. Hare assisted by the Rev. Mr. White law, of Hagersville, who was an intimate friend of the deceased, after which interment with Masonic honors took place in Springvale cemetery.

The Pall bearers being R. W. Smith, W. J. Fallis, Geo. L. Miller, John Thompson, Richard Parkinson and John C. Ross.

erect a stone over the grave. He was always in high spirits, quick to obey orders, efficient in doing his duty and beloved by all, indeed one of the most thoroughly efficient men in the Battalion. His funeral (military) was attended by the company as well as other units in the Battalion, and was witnessed by literally thousands of soldiers and civilians in this camp who as he passed by, gravely and reverently saluted him—the embodiment of a nation's sacrifice.

The coffin draped in the old flag was covered with flowers from his comrades-in-arms.

Major Brown having himself lost a son in this war, adds a personal message of sympathy with the bereaved.
