The Pressing Need of Men

The Prime Minister of this Province and the leader of the Opposition, have both been busy lately from the trenches and have been brought back oute distinguishing themselves. To these distinguished "heroes" and Mr. D. C. Allen are constantly being referred. A few days ago Mr. D. C. Allen was invited to the home of the late Mr. D. C. Allen, to talk to the young men who were nearly worn out by the war. He was being slowly worn down, and broken, but it will be a long and weary struggle before he can give up. In England he had spoken to Lloyd George and had asked him what Ontario can do. "Ontario can do more than she has done," said that eminent statesman, "by sending men and more men. We can win this war only by using every resource and every available man."

Speaking the same day in another part of the Province Mr. Rowell said: "But I want to point out here, and in this I am speaking for myself, have we yet in Canada commenced to realize the seriousness of the situation?" "If this war was going to continue more than another year, he ventured to fear, unless there was considerable improvement, that we must either withdraw our Divisions from the front, or we must ask Great Britain by conscription to fill up our Divisions with her men, or we must provide the necessary reinforcements for our men at the front."

All this makes it very apparent that we must straighten ourselves out for a stiff struggle. The war is not over yet by any means, and we shall have to put a great deal of power into the field before we shall be able to win the day. The personal impressions brought back by Mr. Hearst and Mr. Rowell ought to carry weight with all those who have at heart the welfare of the country. Reduced to practical terms this means that all the readers of this paper must face their duty to enlist, or if they are not eligible themselves, to do everything in their power to see that eligible men whom they know are linked up with some Overseas Battalion.

Letter from England

The following is a letter received by Mrs. Lucretia Bondfield from one of the Canadian privates from "Somewhere in France," thanking her for the receipt of a pair of socks.

France, Nov. 19
Miss S. Bondfield,
Jarvis, Ont.

Dear Miss Bondfield: Just a little letter to tell you I received a dandy pair of socks which you had sent inside. Let me tell you they are good ones and we need them here for we're out all night and it's so cold. I think they were sent on from England to the front for we need them more here and those in England can easily get them.

Wonder if you know any folks I know. My home is in Wingham, about 75 miles north of London and before enlisting I was window trimmer and card writer at Anderson and Co's Store in St. Thomas.

And now I can't tell you very much more. We're living in cellars and dugouts and it's some life. You wouldn't think men could live as we do but we are the most happy-go-lucky bunch you ever saw.

I expect to go out on patrol between the two front lines, just to see that "Fritz" isn't monkeying with our barbed wire, maybe will meet him out there, if we do, I hope to see him first, and now I must close, with best regards,

The bereaved widow and family have the sincere sympathy of the entire community.

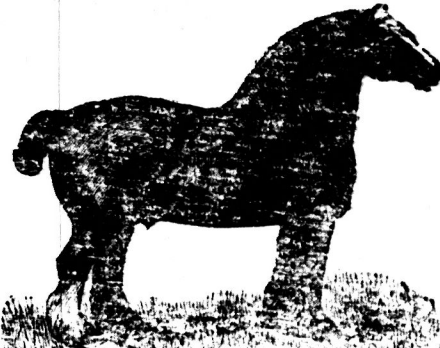
