Economy in Time and Money

The following paper was given by Mrs. R. Parkinson at the last meeting of the Varney Women's Institute at the home of Mrs. D. Parkinson.

The subject admits of a very wide and varied interpretation. We are apt to attempt to discuss it in detail, volumes instead of pages would be required. It is a regrettable fact that in this period of world-wide stress, waste of both time and funds prevail to an alarming extent. It is also true that it is easier to note the fact than it is to suggest a remedy.

Economy, in the strict sense of the term is the disposition of the means at our disposal to the best possible advantage. As individuals it is easy for us to point out how our friends and associates could improve their methods to properly respect, it is another matter to properly regulate our own lives and actions. The circumstances and conditions surrounding the individual are so different, the weapons with which he fights the battle of life so varied, that it unwise to pass judgement upon the workings out of details as applied to others except in cases of conspicuous waste.

Take the question of time. A day of twenty-four hours is placed at our disposal. We are directed to apportion them to their proper objects, namely, prayer, labor, refreshment and sleep. We are to arrange the proportions to arrange the proportions to suit our several needs. We may pray less and work more or vice versa as we see fit. So it is with refreshment and sleep. What might be sufficient for one of us would perhaps fall short of meeting the requirements of our next door neighbor. It is a complex one. Jones observes to me that he has to get up while Smith holds that the time spent in picking up such trifles could be better employed. Both are equally successful in life, both are practicing economy, both are producing the goods to support their theories, it is merely a difference in the point of view.

Sitting awhile with hands folded is not necessarily a waste of time. We may perhaps be storing energy for renewed effort. We are told to plan our work, to reduce effort to a system. We are also told that the best laid plans often miscarry. As a matter of fact both are correct. Though our plans may be upset as they frequently are, the mental peace induced by careful planning makes the effort worth while.

Sir Thos. Water, in a recent interview by the London Times, stated that the policy which he regards as essential for Canada and the Empire is national orgeanism, providing among other things for the conservation of the individual economy in food, dress and personal expenditure. He might have added the conservation of the gratificatory and the mercantile.

The Government that calls for economy must first set the pace. At a recent house meeting to discuss the high cost of living, Dr. Margaret Gordon declared that the children at home had as much much right to be fed as the boys at the front. "The boys who are accomplishing such heavy burdens in Europe need our care," said she, "but what about the boys and girls who are to come after them." We ask for a commission on which women would sit. If such a body were appointed the situation would soon be relieved. At the same meeting Mrs. Danison made the significant statement that she had no use for the bobbing sock knitters with incomes up to \$50,000 a year making machines for three cents. "If there is anything more useful for them to do I am very sorry for them," said she. "Such able bodied women could do a better work for the country that machines could do. When we see so many limousines, etc., flying around the city streets and so much extravagance on all sides we know there is something wrong." All this in the same issue of the journal which published the reprint of Sir Thos. Water's interview. It may have been that he had upper tandom more particularly in mind. While it is true that luxuries abound more particularly on the tables of the wealthy, it is also true that we, who, in the struggle to make ends meet, have to content ourselves mainly with essentials, could study with advantage the recently published statement of Sir Thos. Water, the bill of fare so as to benefit both our health and our pocket books. At the same time there is a happy medium to be observed. Oatmeal porridge and milk will sustain life but the scripsinal junction to eat, drink and enjoy the fruit of our labor calls for a little more variety.

In the matter of dress, being below envy and above contempt seems to fill the bill. As a recent Institute speaker has put it "dress comfortable and cut out the fold robe."

It is rather more than likely that likely that under the head of "personal expenditure" we will find the greatest opportunity for practicing economy. The purchasing of little whims and fancies, not necessary to the preservation of health and vigor should be reduced to a minimum until peace and renewed property are once more our portion. It is a duty we owe to ourselves, our community and our country.

Successful Entertainment

A greater tribute could have been paid to the popular and enthusiastic Superintendent of the Garnet Methodist Sunday School than the crowds which attended the anniversary services on Sunday last.

The Rev. Dobson, of Toronto, gave two eloquent and illustrative addresses, to the children in the morning and the adults in evening.

The supper and program the following night was enjoyed by a packed house, the seats, aisles and choir left being taxed to the utmost. The usual school songs, recitations and dialogues were given which brought out the talents of the younger members of the school but the climax was not reached until a patriotic dialogue which lasted over half an hour, gave the crowd a chance to see the dramatic ability and the patriotic spirit of the Garnet Sunday School.

Garnet has given over twenty-five sons to the Empire's cause with only one casualty as yet, a fact that any Sunday School of one hundred and ten may well boast, this explains the patriotic enthusiasm of the congregation.

Miss Laura Christie, as Britannia and Miss Olive Parkinson, as Canada, deserve a great deal of praise for the way their parts were acted.
