A deal has practically been completed by which the Home Gas Co., with holdings a short distance from Caledonia, and controlled by Hamilton capital, has been sold. The wells have been purchased by Dr. E. N. Berry, of Caledonia. T. J. Stewart, M. P., Geo. Guy, Wm. Stroud, John Lennox, R. E. Foster and the late C. D. Blackford were directors of the company. The wells have been lying idle since a year ago when the Dominion Natural Gas Co. stopped purchasing the supply.

The year 1915 established new record prices for dairy products. We may reasonably ask why? Many reasons may be offered but every one knows people must eat in war time and the dairy cow supplies largely to that need. One result is high prices for grade cows. Pure bred cows have in most dairy tests won the prize money, and to do so must give more and better milk than her progeny is far more valuable as well as herself. In the majority of cases the pure-bred cow has just displaced the grade and when we realize that in Holsteins there have been so far somewhere about 40,000 registrations in Canada, we know many years must lapse before the country will be supplied. Now we raise the question how will the people of the great Empire in Europe be fed when the war is over and when will they look for buying stock to take the place of their depleted herds? Think over these questions and halt the solution.

Jarvis Library Board

The annual meeting of the Public Library Board was held in the Library Room on Tuesday evening, Jan. 25th with James Noble in the chair. After the reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting, the Treasurer presented his report which showed receipts of \$106.46; Cash on hand from 1914, \$23.24, for a total of \$129.70. Expenditures for books, paper, etc., \$114.76; Balance on hand, \$15.94. The Librarian's report was as follows—

Books issued, Fiction, 785; Literature, 93; Miscellaneous, 269; History, 66; Travel, 100; Religious, 33; Biography, 8; Poetry, 3; Science, 4. Total, 1699.

Capt. Cooper now a Lt.-Colonel

Capt. John Cooper, who has been serving as a special recruiting officer with the 11th Haldimand County Battalion, has been promoted to the rank of lieutenant-colonel and has been appointed to take command of the 186th Overseas Battalion which is to be raised in Toronto in the near future. Recruiting operations for the 186th will probably not be started before March 1st, but in the meantime Colonel Cooper will organize his staff and lay plans for a recruiting campaign.

Col. Cooper was for twenty years with the Queen's Own Rifles, having joined the University company, "K" company in 1896 as a private. After serving as a Sergeant and Color Sergeant, Col. Cooper received a commission in 1896. He remained with the Q. O. R. until 1911 when he was transferred to the reserve of officers. He donned his uniform once more, however, when Brigadier General Logic sent him to assist the raising of the Haldimand County Battalion for overseas.

Col. Cooper is a well-known newspaper man, being editor and vice-president of the Canadian Courier. He was the first president of the Canadian Club of Toronto. He is also a past president of the Canadian Press Association.
