SECOND DAY

Ingles-Pyle—That this Council make a grant of \$300 to the Haldimand Children's Aid Society, to be paid in quarterly instalments, the first instalment to be paid forthwith. Carried.

Clark-Toohy—in amendment, that we lay the question of a children's shelter over till we get further light on the question. Lost.

Smelser-Bradford—That J. W. Sheppard and A. E. Havill be appointed auditors to audit the accounts of the Treasurer, also of the House of Refuge.

Ingles-Pyle—That S. E. Lindsay be hereby appointed High School Trustee for Hagersville for 1916-7-8.

Bradford-Pyle—That W. J. Griffith be appointed to the Board of Education for Dunnville High School for 1916-7-8.

Simenton-Anderson—That John W. Richardson and W. D. Roulston be appointed Criminal Auditors. Carried.

Ingles-Pyle—That C. B. Almas and W. D. Roulston be appointed Criminal Auditors. Lost.

Toohy-Stewart—That the County Council recommend that Ralph Currie and W. A. Berry be appointed County Constables.

Report on Communications

We, your special committee on communications beg leave to report as follows:

With reference to communication from Deputy Minister W. A. McLean, we recommend that the County Road Supt. attend the meeting of Road Superintendents, and that his necessary hotel and railway expenses be paid as part of his expenditure under the act.

That the notice of filing award and of costs of opening up, making and maintaining of a drain from station 800 to the outlet into South Forks drain be referred to the County Road Committee.

That the statement of the Treasurer of the County of Norfolk, showing the amounts paid to the County of Haldimand, be filed with the Clerk.

We recommend the communication of Mr. C. C. James, of the Department of Agriculture, be filed.

Municipal World, no action.

Letter from J. T. White in regard to the payment of war tax, we recommend that payment be made as soon as funds can be arranged.

In regard to the Teachers Superannuation Bill no action be taken.

That a grant of \$10 be made to the Hospital for Sick Children.

That the communication from Mr. W. A. McLean notifying that the Ontario Highways Act has been brought into effect on the 18th inst., by proclamation be filed.

Application of National Sanitarium Association asking for grant, no action be taken.

That a grant of \$10.00 be made to the Monck Farmers' Institute.

In regard to communication from A. Werner, Sec. Treas. of the Trustees Department of the Ontario Educational Association, no action.

Hastings County Council, no action.
