Haldimand Germans.

Prof. F. V. Hoch of addressed a series of patriotic meetings in the German sections of Haldimand recently under the auspices of the County Recruiting League, officers of the 114th Battalion accompanying him everywhere.

A very large audience received him on his visit to Fisherville, a German settlement. The Prof. addressed the audience in a way unknown in the history of Fisherville. He explained the German situation, which 600 men, mostly men, were in the audience. Many had travelled 12 miles on bad roads to hear him. He exposed the German militarism and fervently appealed to Canadians of German blood to put humanity above racial feeling. Immediately several young men came to the platform and signed up and it is expected that many more recruits will be secured.
