Captain Cockburn explained that after he men got to the trenches hey had no .inc to wash or darn the socks and the only change they had was to change them from one foot to the other. If they had to wear the government socks a month it was surely a hardship. The socsk dispensed with by the soldiers were not thrown away, but were given to the peasant women who unrave, led them an i used the yarn lo knit socks for h ir children.
