

sympathy and support. The Guild was formed by Her Majesty the Queen upon the outbreak of the war to assist in the relief of the suffering caused thereby. Donations are sent from all parts of the world to Friary Court, St. James' Palace, ondon, Eng., where the Queen personally supervises their distribution. Her Majesty's chief aim is to meet the greatest need, and the contributions are at once forwarded to where account it is not desirable that donations be specially designated, as Her Majesty is kept informed as to where the articles may be distributed to the best advantage. Lists of requirements are issued weekly from Friary Court, and the endeavor of the branches is to fill these needs as promptly as possible. Recently a large number of Christmas puddings, cakes, etc., were received at the Montreal headquarters and as the officers considered that these were more in the form of personal gifts to the Canadians, they were forwarded to the Canadian Field Comforts Association at Shorncliffe, England, to be forwarded direct to the Canadians in the trenches.

Since its inception, the Canadian

Branch has forwarded weekly humdreds of parcels and cases of goods socks, mufflers, housewives, and a approve of the project contribute, thousand and one similar devices, all calculated to bring some comfort to some soldier or sailor.
