Jarvis Recruiting League

Your King and Country need you NOW.

Be ready when the call comes. Service and sacrifice are the handmaiden of Liberty.

Each man eligible for military service should hurry up or it will be too late. The best men are married.

Don't worry over the year that is past. A year ago you can be remembered in the annals of British history.

The British people may differ as to the relative merits of the voluntary and compulsory principles of enlistment, but, in the words of Sir Edward Grey, they have made up their minds not to become the conscript appendage of any military power.

It is now up to Canadian sports to follow "Jack" Greer's lead. The sportsmen's battalion ought to beat the record for recruiting.

Here is a short article copied from the "20th" Gazette, a paper printed at the front for the benefit of the men in the firing line. The article is a satire on "enslaving" and is entitled "Our Journey Here" and reads as follows:—

"We left — on the — day of — and after a refreshing march over the plains of — off ly embarked on the — for — where we arrived at — o'clock on the — day of — safely. After sauntering through the well paved streets of — we gaily made our way to the comfortable quarters at — prepared for us by the — Regiment.

Another specimen of the good spirit of the men is shown in the dry humor of the article, "Notes on Bird Life."

Running the Newspaper.

Everybody thinks he can run a newspaper better than the benighted souls who have been placed by Providence in that unenviable position. Maybe it's because the editor's faults are glaring once-out in the open in plain black and white, or possibly, it is just a queer quirk of human nature and the job's so easy anyway.

If the editor is for anything the antis condemn him, and vice versa. If he takes a stand he is trying to dictate to the community. If he doesn't take a stand he is a molly-coddle and a jellyfish. He is a crank, a reformer, a fanatic, a four-flusher, a crank, a disturber of the peace or just a plain idiot, according as he meets with the desires of his subscribers or goes against them. And there you are. The average man never thinks of the hours of toil, downright, soul-sweating toil it takes to get out a paper. He never thinks of the worries, the trials, the tribulations every editor must undergo. And some of them are so unappreciative of his efforts to boost the town and make money for them, that they won't even contribute the price of a subscription.

Just remember this.—The editor apart from the laudable desire to make a decent living for himself and his family, has the good of the community at heart. If he disagrees with you on any subject, political, moral, or educational, you and not he may be in wrong.
