### Death of James Duncan

In the death of James Duncan Jarvis and vicinity loses one of its oldest and most valued citizens.

Born in Scotland in 1837, he came to this country in early manhood. Working at different places throughout this vicinity he finally made his home with Mr. Gideon Snyder, at that time proprietor of the brick kilns, for whom he worked seventeen years. Mr. Duncan then resided in Hamilton for six years being in the employ of the Hamilton Steel Works. For the last few years he has made his home with Mr. Gideon Snyder of Jarvis. On July 1st, 1915, he was forced to take to his bed, and since then his barometer of health has risen and fallen, until last week, when his strength failing, he passed quietly away on Saturday morning.

His life was a lasting example of the Scottish Stock. Besides being a member of the Knox Church, Jarvis, he was an active member in fraternal societies. He was a valued brother of the Jarvis Masonic order and belonged to the Simcoe Chapter, and the Scottish Rites of Hamilton. He also belonged to the A.O.U.W. The funeral took place on Monday last to the Oakwood cemetery, Simcoe, the last rites being performed by the Masonic order. His only survivor is one nephew, James Dunn of Woodhouse.

### Norfolk Lad Faces Murder Charge

Simcoe, July 2.—North Walsingham Township, the scene of the Christian Shop murder in May, 1915, was the scene of another shooting fatality this afternoon as a result of which Robert Henry Beecher, a sixteen year old Barnado boy, will be placed on trial for his life.

Beecher was brought to the Simcoe County jail here to-night by High Constable Murphy on a remand on a charge of having shot to death John Simmons, a farm laborer. It is alleged that Beecher shot and killed Simmons with a 22-calibre rifle in the course of a dispute. The affair took place on the farm of Miss Ada Carr, where Simmons has been working for the proprietress. Miss Carr has given young Beecher a home for the past seven years, and has given him a good education. For the past two years he has been attending Port Rowan High School.

The Carr farm is located near Forrestville, midway between St. Williams and Port Rowan.

Beecher was arranged this afternoon, following the murder, before Magistrate John Cope, of St. Williams. It is understood that, after denying the shooting, he broke down and admitted the deed. Cornerer Dr. Meek, of Port Rowan, will hold an inquest to-morrow, and the preliminary hearing has been arranged for Friday next, July 7. The lad was in a state of nervous collapse when he was placed in jail here to-night. He appeared to appreciate his position, and the gravity of the charge against him.

### Presentation and Address
