A large number of the townpeople turned out Sunday morning to speed the departing 114th Batt. which passed through here on their way to the training quarters at Camp Borden. When the train reached Hagersville special services were held, especially for the local detachments. A number from this vicinity motored over to Hagersville where one of the largest crowds ever seen in that place was assembled. The Dunnville Detail came on a special train to Hagersville where they were joined by that unit. In the departure of the boys the war and its meaning has been brought home more forcibly than ever. True, there have been individual homes who know the bitterness of it, but in the passing of the best of young manhood of the County, though making the heart sore with thoughts of the future, yet will need stir those left at home to greater efforts.

A Letter from France

The following is a letter received by Miss Alderson, of Toronto, who has been spending the past week in Jarvis, from the late General Mercer, who was killed in action, somewhere in France. The majority of our readers will recall the gallant death of the late general, the paragraphs of which appeared in the daily papers some time ago, and his letter, though brief, depicts the spirit of a soldier of the first rank.

Oct. 13-15.

DEAR IDA— I have received your kind letter and wish to express appreciation of your generous words in reference to the loss of the first contingent. It is a great pleasure to confirm the opinion of those at home. All ranks are quite worthy of the deepest respect of the nation. I can speak quite personally in their behalf. They have, so far, done well in maintaining the high traditions of the British army and in emulating the gallant example of the Allied Comrades in daily example and endurance. All have placed duty higher than life and made every sacrifice with cheerfulness. Though the conditions of service have been severe, I have never heard a word of complaint from any one of our men. It is all together a strange life. There is no future but the great beyond. One rarely thinks of making a personal arrangement for the morrow. Even the past must be buried or its bitter memories would unbalance the mind. It is sufficient for the moment that one is spared to do a little bit for the cause.
