### Women Murdered

Chicago, July 24—Demented, angry or desperate, an unidentified man took his beautiful wife and six-month-old son along the west bank of the Skokie River in Lake Forest, Illinois, and within a short distance of the fashionable Onwentsie Club, is thought to have waited till they had fallen asleep, then killed them both and himself. The bodies were discovered on Sunday.

The police learned that the victims of the tragedy lived in Flint, Mich., where the man, whose initials were L.A.C., was a bookkeeper in the Buick Automobile Co. The family came to Lake Forest on Thursday. They said they had been in Chicago on a vacation.

Flint, Mich., July 24—Newspaper men have identified the victims of the Lake Forest triple tragedy as Loyd A. Crandall, his wife and their baby, Arthur Crandall, had boarded in this city for some time at the home of Mrs. Leonard Cady, but had been ordered to leave, Mrs. Cady stated to-day, because in spite of the fact the infant was but six months old, its father had severely whipped it many times.

Mrs. Crandall, whose maiden name was Norma Tiedale, came here from her home in Simcoe, Ontario, to marry Crandall. Soon after the marriage, the couple moved to Port Dover, Ont., but later returned to Flint. One week ago Crandall resigned his position with the automobile company here, and left the city, taking his family with him. This was the last heard of them until the news of the tragedy came. Crandall's brother and several sisters live in Brantford, Ontario.

### No Services

### Beecher Committed for Trial

Robert Henry Beecher was on Friday last at St. William committed for trial on the grave charge of murder of his preliminary hearing before Police Magistrate John Cope and Squire John Abel. The commitment that sends him back to the jail to await trial for his life says that he unlawfully did shoot with the intent to kill, John Simmons, and did thereby cause the death of the said John Simmons, on the 2nd day of July, 1916, in the township of Cheshamville. He will remain in confinement here until the 23rd day of September, next—Simcoe Reform.

### A Forestry Battalion

A military unit whose ideals and aims should appeal to any man anxious to do his bit for the Empire, but who still does not feel like trusting himself to the hazardous life of the trenches, or with any of the fighting forces, is the 23rd Forestry Battalion; which, under the command of Lieut. Col. W. R. Smyth, M. P., for Algoma, has recently received authorization to recruit all over Ontario and as far west as the Pacific coast. While the military duties of the Foresters will not carry them into the fighting zone, the service which they will be called upon to perform are just as essential to the saving of the Empire as is the actual fighting in which other units must engage.

It will be remembered that a short time ago the 23rd Forestry Battalion, the first of its kind to be raised in Canada, was sent over to England to cut down the forests of Great Britain in order to keep the men at the front supplied with the necessary timber for the building of trenches, bridges, railways, dugouts, and for the one hundred and other uses to which timber must be put on the firing line. This unit is now engaged in training out the historical forests of Windsor, but as they are unable to turn out enough material for the front the call has been sent out for two similar battalions to be raised in Canada, and one of them, the 23rd, is now making its appeal all through this district for young farmers, boatmen, sawyers, lumbermen, mill hands and any other person who thinks he is husky enough to play his part in forestry work. The work should prove exceedingly interesting and the men who joins this battalion has the added advantage of being able to acquire all the glory of wearing a uniform without taking any of the risks of warfare.

Col. Smyth is out for a whirlwind campaign to raise his 1200 men and has September 1 as the date for bringing his unit up to strength. There is no doubt he will obtain his objective, judging by the vast applications coming in to the various recruiting depots. The latest figures available showed that during the first two weeks of recruiting there were 222 men accepted in Ontario alone, while similar recruiting is in progress all over the Western provinces. From this it is well to warn any person that if he wishes to catch a place on a safe battalion he should not lose any time about it.

While the headquarters of the unit are at 43 Bank Street, Ottawa, the head recruiting depot for Ontario is located at 55 Queen Street West, where Lt. H. S. Price, a brother of Lieut. Col. W. H. Price of the 204th Battalion is in charge. Slightly over fifty men have already been attested at this one depot, and now arrangements are being made for the opening of nine other recruiting stations throughout the city. At the same time it is well to note that the physical qualifications for the 23rd Foresters have been reduced somewhat from the standard set for the fighting units, as ability to swing an axe is of far greater importance to them than is the handling of a rifle. Other recruiting depots have been opened at Barrow, Hull, Maniwaki, Buckingham, New London, Parry Sound, Windsor, Port Colborne, Tawamash, Sault Ste. Marie, Gore Bay, Port Arthur, Winnipeg, Vancouver, Pembroke, Fenelon Falls, Fort Frances and Cochrane in addition to other western centres.
