For the information of those sending parcels to soldiers in England or at the front. The rates of postage are as follows: To England, the rate is 12 cents a pound, or any fraction thereof. The limit rate on parcels to England is 11 pounds. To France or Belgium, the rate is 24 cents for parcels any weight up to three pounds; from three to seven pounds (the limit), the rate is 32 cents, not 32 cents per pound but 32 cents for any weight from 3 to 7 pounds. Any letter or parcel for any soldier in a hospital (even if the hospital is not known to the sender) having the word "hospital" marked across it, will be delivered. A custom declaration must be attached to each parcel, for which application should be made at the stamp window of the post office.
