The limit rate on parcels to England is 11 pounds. To France or Belgium, the rate is 24 cents for parcels any weight up to three pounds ; from three to seven pounds (the limit), the rate is 32 cents, not 32 cents per pound but The Germans seem to have been 32 cents for any weight from 3 to 7 hospital is not known to the sender having the word "hospital" marke tom declaration must be attached to each parcel, for which application should be made at the window of the post office.
