Not only has the wastage by reason of Not only has the wastage by reason of war been enormous, but in all the belligerent countries, not omitting Great Britain, there has either been a partial stoppage or a whole stoppage of breeding by reason of the scarcity of labor, the disturbed conditions, or entire devastation.

Whether the war lasts or ceases there nust continue an undiminished demand for horses. When peace comes there will be a long period of replenishment, Then quality as much and even more than quantity will be required. Hence the evident call to every Canadian farmer is to breed and to breed to the best available, to utilize his mares for production and to secure the immediate services of the best pure bred sire of type in his neighborhood. It will pay.

This appeal is addressed to you with the endorsation of the various horse breeders' associations of Canada, who urge decisive action by the farmers of Canada, to remedy the serious situation that has arisen.


