## Death of Ainsley Jackson

The sad news of the death of Ainsley Quinn Jackson caused general regret and mourning when it became known on Thursday morning last. Ainsley had been in poor health for some time but had continued his teaching until a few weeks before his death.

He was born the 18th of February, in Walpole. Some ten years ago he, with his mother and sisters, moved to Jarvis. He continued his studies in the High School and succeeded in graduating from the Normal College in 1912. Since then he has filled very successfully the position as teacher of School Section No. 21 Walpole in Walpole.

He was a young man of sterling qualities and admired by those who knew him best. He was an earnest worker in the Methodist Church and at the time of his death filled the offices of Assistant Superintendent of the Sunday School, President of the Epworth League, Sunday School Teacher, member of the Choir and Secretary of the Bible Society. He will be greatly missed and his place will be hard to fill and he was always ready to do his part when asked.

We call his life short, but was it when you consider we live in deeds, not years; in thoughts, not breaths; in feelings, not figures on a dial. He most lives who feels the noblest, acts the best.

On March 25 last, he was married to Miss Marion Davidson, of this place, who, being left a widow, was very early in life, with his widowed mother and only sister, the sincere sympathy of all.

The funeral was held from his mother's residence on Saturday last, at 1.30 o'clock to the Methodist Church for service and interment and was one of the largest ever seen in Jarvis, showing the esteem in which the deceased was held. The service was conducted by the pastor, the Rev. Mr. Foote, assisted by Reverends J. R. McCrimmon, of Knox Church, H. L. Roberts, of St. Catharines and C. R. Moore, of Hamilton, a former pastor of both families, who paid fitting tribute to the late Mr. Jackson's character. The pall bearers were Messrs. W. Bailey, B. Johnson, M. Honey, W. Biggar, J. Dellar and C. Wilson.

Those from a distance were a classmate from Dundas and friends from Hamilton, Ridgeway, Paris, Montrose, Selkirk, Hagersville, Simcoe and Oneida. Com.

The Council was asked to gain permission from the fire telephone Co. for a special ring to those having phones in case of fire. Another is called for Friday evening in the Temperance Hall.
