

He continued his studies in the High School and succed in graduating from the Normal College in 1912. Since then he has filled very successfully the position as

teacher of School Section No. 21 Walpole He was a young man of stirling qualities and admired by those who knew him hest. He was an earnest worker in the Methodist Church and at the time of his death filled the offices of Assistant Superintendent of the Sunday School, President of the Epworth League, Sunday School Teacher, member of the Choir and Secretary of the Bible Society. He will he greatly missed and his place will be hard to fill and he was always ready to do his part when asked.
