





TOE-Divide the 69 stitches be-J. R. Seater. Jarvis tween the three needles, 23 on each. seen the three needles, 23 on each.

1st row—Knit together 1st and 2nd and return on an account of \$10.00 stitches on each needle.

2nd ro-Knit together 2nd and 3rd or over. stitches on each needle. 3rd row-Knit together 3rd and 4th

stitches on each needle. And so on, beginning again with lst and 2nd stitches after reaching the last stitches on each needle. Decrease to nine stitches. Draw wool through stitches, and darn in care-

THE WOMEN OF POLAND.

The Polish .. omen are noted for their patriotism, their self-sacrificing heroism, and their beauty.

Their patriotism comes down from the Princess Wanda, daughter of Krakus out of myth and legend, who preferred to drown herself in the Vistula rather than cause misery upon her country because of her beauty. The beautiful Queen Hedwig (Jadwiga), who was betrothed to an Austrian prince and whom she loved, at the solicitation of Polish statesmen, married Jagiello, the grand duke of Lithuania, to convert him to the Christian faith and to join Lithuania with Poland.

Then there was Chrzanowska, who defended Trembowia against the With her own hand she Turks. loaded and aimed the cannon and threatened to kill her husband and herself if he yielded, until finally Sobieski came to her rescue. Frederick the Great of Prussia once said, 'In Poland the women attend to politics while the men get drunk." This was, an unintentional compliment to the mentality of the Polish women.

In literature, music, art, and science the Polish women occupy a very high place. The discoverer of radium was a Polish woman, Mme. Sklodowska Curie. They are good linguists and nearly all speak two or

Says an English traveler who has spent considerable time in Poland: "I occasionally meet with exaggerations in connection with Polish affairs, but certainly no one has ever exaggerated the grace and beauty of the Polish women. They have given numberless proofs of patriotism; and many of them, with all their delicacy of organization, have not shrunk from encountering great personal dangers for the sake of their country. But whatever noble qualities they may possess, they probably would not have the influence which they actually exercise over their countrymen if Providence had not also bestowed on them, in a remarkable degree, the gift of beauty.

"Many of the Polish women are very like English women of the slen-Clubbing der, delicate type, but with pater complexions, and brighter and generally, darker eyes. I thought it was impossible to see finer and more rapid expression than their faces exvaried expression than their faces exsibited; for I saw them at a time when their enthusiasm, their indignation, their sorrow, and all their reigious feeling were awakened. The Polish mothers bring up the

young Poles as patriots, and the Poish wives exclude from society all whose patriotism is even doubtful. That is to say, the women in Poland do their duty like the men, and nurture the Polish spirit, and keep up the Polish traditions which the men, secording to their opportunities. have to defend."

nese words: "If no prescription has as yet been discovered for making a Russian or a Terman out of a Pole, it is because he Polish women have kept the countain head of the national life pure and incorruptible. soldiers of all ages have fought in the ranks of all the armies of the world against the hosts of tyranny it has not been because they were bred soldiers, but because with their mothers' milk they drank in patriotism; because the Polish mothers sang into their very lallabys the love of liberty and fatherland that will never die out of the Polish heart."


