## Death of John G. Lemon

One of the old landmarks of this vicinity passed away last Saturday morning in the person of John G. Lemon at the home of his son, Frank, of St. Thomas, in his 77th year. Mr. Lemon, although in poor health for a number of years, was only taken seriously ill about a month previous to his decease.

Mr. Lemon was born on May 11, 1839, in the township of Waipole, on what is known as the old Lemon farm, now occupied by Carl Smith, where he resided for the major part of his life, some sixty-one years. On Sept. 12, 1866, he was united in marriage to Jane Farr, of which union here were four children, one boy and three girls, all of whom are living except Mrs. Lemon, who died some five years ago. Those that are living are Mrs. Porter, of Embro, and Mrs. J. M. Wright, of Mount Hope, and Frank of St. Thomas.

Mr. Lemon, while in this vicinity, earned himself to all those who knew him and demanded the respect of those in business relations. He was a prominent member of the Township Council for a number of years and was recorded as one of the most able class leaders in the history of the Methodist Church of this place, of which church he was a faithful member during his sojourn here. In politics he was a staunch liberal, and was also closely related with the Home Guard and the A. O. U. W.

After leaving Jarvis, he, with his wife, moved to Ingersoll, where they resided until the death of his life partner, some 14 years ago. Since then, Mr. Lemon has made his home in St. Thomas, with his son Frank, making during his sojourn there, many fast friends.

Interment took place to the Methodist church cemetery last Monday afternoon from the 230 Wabash express.

The Record joins with his many admirers, in mourning the loss of a Canadian.

## Plant at the Falls Is Blown Up.

Niagara Falls, March 7.—The Castner Electrolytic Alkali Company's large works situated on Buffalo avenue and 22nd street, at Niagara Falls, N. Y., was blown up at 10.30 this evening, and completely demolished, killing five men and injuring more than a dozen other persons so far as known.

There were some seven or eight distinct explosions following closely one after the other. The plant manufactured caustic soda and material for high explosive, employing a number of men, working night and day shifts. A general fire alarm was given, calling out the entire city fire and police departments. An attempt was made some six or seven weeks ago to blow up the same plant with dynamite, but only slight damage was caused to a part of the building. The work this evening was successful in both the destruction of the plant and probably a dozen lives of employees. The greatest excitement prevails at Niagara Falls, N. Y., and it is expected the state militia will be ordered out.
