Soldier Lads at Sandusk.

A Pleasant Evening Spent by the Boys in Khaki.

A little over a week ago information was received that at about 5.30 p.m. on Thursday, March 2, Sandusk would be visited by the soldiers of the Hagerstown detail. Plans were immediately laid for their reception. An arch of evergreen was built at the gateway and decorated with the Union Jack. At the stated time about sixty men in the King's uniform passed under the arch and the hall, and standing around flower decked tables sang "Be Present at Our Table Lord."

The ladies served oysters and other delicacies to the apparently appreciative band, after which the hall was cleared of the tables and the men in khaki gave a very interesting programme. Rev. Mr. Shields gave an address on the importance of enlisting and Corporal Clark, a wounded soldier from the front, gave some very interesting details of the war. Another name was added to the list of Sandusk boys who have volunteered to fight on the cause of right. Sandusk boys of three boys, Charles Bush, George Simpson, and Leo Pond. The soldiers were billeted in different homes until the next afternoon, when the men with teams and lights took them to Garnet.

Mrs. J. B. Pond, carrying the Union Jack gave the following address of welcome to the soldiers—

Mr. Chairman and men in uniform. Before to-night we had thought it would be a very easy and pleasant duty to speak a few words of welcome.

But after the more practical and substantial welcome which you have just paraken and apparently thoroughly enjoyed words seem rather shallow.

However it is a pleasure to welcome you among us. Surely to entertain so many in khaki is an honor equal to entertaining Royalty. Never before in the history of our community have we been honored by so many men among us who have volunteered to fight for us. Men whose faces and uniform bespeak their willingness to do their bit. Yes we believe their spirit is manifest in your faces the same spirit as shown by the soldier who, when asked if he intended to die for his country said, "No, but I intend to make half a dozen of those Germans die for theirs." We hope that as you are marching to Berlin you will think of this little visit to Sandusk, and we assure you, we will consider it an honor to be remembered.

We welcome you among us as a band of gallant men, who have bravely answered the call to duty and have volunteered to fight for the cause of right. We are proud that Hagerstown has men who will fight for British

Liberty and British Justice, who will fight for Canadian Manhood.

We are also proud that some of our sons are among you and as we hand them over with breaking hearts our prayers go with them.

We hope, ladies and gentlemen, that you be called overseas no actual submarine will cross you path, no German sharpshoot will creep those many forms or disguise those noble faces, no poison gas will injure your health. Yes, we pray that God may grant you final victory and a safe return.

But, should it be God's will that some of you never return, is it not possible, yes probable, that in a few months of strenuous effort in the path of duty you will have accomplished more for the world's good than you could have achieved in the three score and ten years aside from that path.

Surely good is coming out of the terrible crisis. Men more than ever before are feeling the weakness of human skill and realizing their need of God. The liquor curse is being wiped out and the Allied Nations are being united in a common brotherhood.

We hope and pray that in this hour of the greatest tragedy of the history of the world you are not going out in your strength but that you are feeling the need of the Divine help and that whether in training or in battle no act of yours will bring discredit to Canadian manhood. No sooner will you leave our shores than we will commence to anxiously look forward to your return. We assure you that while fighting for us we will be praying for you and I'm sure Sandusk is one in saying "Good Luck to the Boys of the Allies."
