Haldimand's Judge

Three New Judgeships Recently Appointed.

Ottawa, March 14.—John S. Campbell, K.C., St. Catharines, has been appointed County Court Judge for Haldimand; G. H. Hopkins, K.C., Lunenburg, for Victoria-Haliburton.

A son of the new judge, Lieut.-Col. Fred Hopkins, of the 10th Battalion, who practiced law with his father, was killed in a motor accident in Haldimand on the 26th of January.

Lieut.-Col. John S. Campbell was for over a year in command of the Welland Canal land frontier protective force, and was later posted to the Headquarters of Military District No. 2. He is a brother of J.H. Campbell, the Police Magistrate of St. Catharines. He is a native of St. Catharines and a graduate of the University of Toronto. Lieut.-Col. Campbell enters the 12th Regiment as a private and rose to the rank of Lieut.-Col. He has practiced law in St. Catharines for years, and is a former Mayor of the town. Judge Hopkins has practiced his profession in Lindsay for a number of years. For many years he acted as solicitor for the town and to many large corporations. Judge Hopkins has always taken a keen interest in many sports and is a curler and golfer of ability.

The Globe was the first to convey to Mr. William D. Swayze of Dunnville the news of his appointment to be County Judge of Victoria and Haldimand Counties. Mr. Swayze attended the Penthill school, after which he entered the law office of Brown & Brown at St. Catharines. Since 1891 he has been practicing law at Dunnville, and is very well known, having been Mayor and is now a member of the Board of Education. He is a Presbyterian and a Conservative.

A BIG BLAZE

Lynn Valley Mill Totally Consumed Saturday March 12.

The mill at Lynn Valley, formerly owned by Mr. Eben Edmunds, but at the time of the fire the property of Mr. David Graham, was burned Saturday evening, March 12, between seven and eight o'clock. The building was a large frame structure that is said to have stood for over a hundred years. The origin of the fire is not definitely stated but probably due to an oil can or a match, as it is in use all day finishing a carload of wood, that was ready to go out on Monday. When discovered the flames had control and building machinery and stock in hand were all consumed, there being absolutely no salvage.

There was insurance on the loss to the amount of \$6,100 in the Economical and Waterloo. The adjusters were here yesterday and allowed the claims in full. The insurance, however, cannot be considered to cover fifty per cent of the loss. The fire made so great a glare in the southeastern sky that the town alarm was sounded.—Simcoe Reformer.

The reflection of the above stated fire was distinctly seen by many people in this vicinity and even as far as Hagersville, much conjecture being caused as to be whereabouts of the blaze.

A Warning.

Colonel Thompson.

Colonel Andrew T. Thompson, ex-M.P., has been appointed officer commanding the 114th Battalion and will go overseas with the unit as soon as it is brought up to strength and has completed preliminary training. The appointment was announced by the minister of militia.

The 114th Battalion, C.E.F., is being recruited in the county of Haldimand and from the Six Nations Indian Reserve adjoining. Lt.-Col. Baxter had the work in hand and was making excellent progress, when he was seized with typhoid fever, dying in Toronto on February 15.

For eight years as C. O., and for three further years in Brigade, Col. Thompson commanded the Haldimand Rifles (37th Reg.) the right half composed of men from that county, the left half of Indians. The 114th is the logical offspring of that corps, so it is not surprising that he should be asked to assume command on the death of Lt. Col. Baxter, and that he accepted immediately. The Colonel's two sons were already in the battalion.

As a recent president of the Canadian Club and a present vice-president of St. Andrew's Society, Colonel Thompson is well known in Ottawa.

An interesting association of a military character has existed for more than a century between Col. Thompson's family and the Six Nations Indians. His grandfather was in every battle on the Niagara Frontier in the war of 1812-14 as were the Indians of that day. His father was "out" in the Fenian Raid, some Indian soldiers accompanying him, and he himself commanded them in the Haldimand battalion for many years. In recognition of his long connection with them, he was made a Mohawk chief on his retirement from command. His deep liking for the red men, and his intimate knowledge of their traits, should serve him well in recruiting five hundred men from that source.

Col. Thompson was second in command of the Canadian Contingent to the Coronation of King Edward III.
