## Home Garden Contest

It is generally recognized that farmers as a rule do not appreciate the value of a kitchen garden. People living in towns and cities usually have a greater variety of vegetables in their back yards than will be found on the farms. With a view to encouraging the use of the greater variety of vegetables in the farm home and at the same time to introduce more desirable varieties than are generally grown, the Department of Agriculture purposes conducting a Home Garden Contest in this County which the following regulations will cover—

1. Boys between the ages of 12 and 15 will be given preference in placing these contests.

2. Each garden will be 30x20 feet.

3. The following will be grown in each garden, the seed of which will be supplied by the Department free of cost—Strawberries, corn, cabbage, peas, beans, onions, green onions, spinach, radish, lettuce, parsnips, beets, carrots and parsley.

4. A blueprint showing the size of garden and arranging of crops will be supplied to each contestant, also directions as to preparing the land, planting, care, etc.

5. The District Representative will inspect the garden after which three prizes will be given as follows—1st prize, \$5.00; 2nd prize, \$3.00; 3rd prize, \$2.00.

This contest should be viewed with favor as there is an opportunity for getting garden supplies at a very small cost and as previously stated all varieties being the best to date.

Entries should be forwarded to the Department of Agriculture, Cayuga, before March 25.

## Death of Mrs. Irwin.

After a painful illness of many months Sarah Kitchen, beloved wife of George Irwin, of Rockford, passed peacefully to rest on Wednesday afternoon, March 22, 1916.

Mrs. Irwin was born near Hagersville on May 19, 1822, being in her 82nd year. She was the daughter of John and Martha (Quiver) Kitchen and became a member of the Baptist Church when but a girl. On August 23, 1850, she was united in marriage to George Irwin and since then they have resided at Rockford, where she has always been connected with the Methodist Church. Mrs. Irwin has always been noted for their kind hospitality, and their home has always been a minister's home.

In August of last year they celebrated their Diamond Wedding.

Although Mrs. Irwin has been an invalid for many years it was not until December last that she was made helpless by a stroke of paralysis.

During the intervening months she has patiently endured the most intense sufferings.

Those who mourn her loss besides her life partner are four sons, John of Saskatchewan, Ansley of Simcoe, George of Jarvis and Alvy at home. Also two daughters, Mrs. Robt. A. McCarter, Jarvis and Miss Ida, who resides at home.

The services were conducted at her late home by her pastor, Rev. Terry of the Townsend Circuit, after which the remains were conveyed to Oakwood Cemetery, Simcoe, for interment.
