The Rearguard at Suvla.

Leut. Ross Stewart, of the Gurkha Rifles, gives the following account of the evacuation of Gallipoli, his regiment having acted as part of the forces covering the retirement. He says:

"I am going to tell you the wonderful story of the evacuation of Suvla and the part we played in it. For a week before the evacuation we were beginning to move away, and the guns were one by one moving off. We had just finished a hard spell of trenches, when we were told that we were to hold the ground to the right of the Lovat Scouts till the very last. It began to get very exciting the last three days, as we were both holding the line very thinly, and had no supports if the Turks had attacked. What a magnificent crowd the Lovats were, the men being all crofters, stalkers, and ghillies from the North, and at least two squadrons from Skye. Then the officers were a most exceptional lot. It was a great compliment to this regiment to be taken in at the last moment to the Highland Mounted Division to form the rearguard. We got our orders from Brodie of Brodie, commanding the division. We were just a mere handful of each on the last night, and though the enemy was no more than 200 yards away, he never detected the manoeuvre. We had a most wonderful night for the evacuation. There was a brilliant moon, but low down by the road to the sea, which we had to take, was a fine white mist rising off the salt lake at Suvla. Waiting for the last minute was the worst of all. The order to march came down, and noiselessly the little bands of men left their trenches by the various routes. We reached the beach, where the lighters were ready to take us off, after a longish march. The Gurkas came on, the rifles at the trail, without a man hit or a single straggler. Our 'father and mother,' the Navy, then took charge of us, and we left the beach at Suvla, to say goodbye for ever to the ill-fated peninsula. We came alongside a pitch-black transport and filled on her last load. Inside we were warmly received by the others who had left before us, and soon were sitting at ease in a saloon with all the comforts of civilization that we had been so long without."

They Are Well Versed.

The German prisoners in Fort Henry have started a daily newspaper with the aid of typewriters. These prisoners of war are well versed in the news of the war, and have maps showing the names and tonnage of every vessel sunk on any sea, besides the positions of the contending armies.

The regular meeting of the Municipal Council met in the office of the Clerk, all members being present with the Reeve in the Chair.

McCarte—That this Council apply to the Grand Trunk Railway System for the erection of a platform and chute for the convenience of the public in loading and unloading heavy machines and that J. A. Burwash and the Clerk be a committee to draft an application and present same to proper officer.—Carried.

Smith-Burwash—That this Council purchase crushed stone and deliver same at Jarvis Station for the streets of Peel and Church as far as the Methodist Church, length about two hundred yards, the committee presenting the petition to all of the grading, teaming and all work connected therewith according to the village specification.—Carried.

Smith-Newell—That this Council do now adjourn until next regular meeting; first Tuesday evening of June, at 8 p.m., and that the Cont. of Revision be held on same date.—Carried.

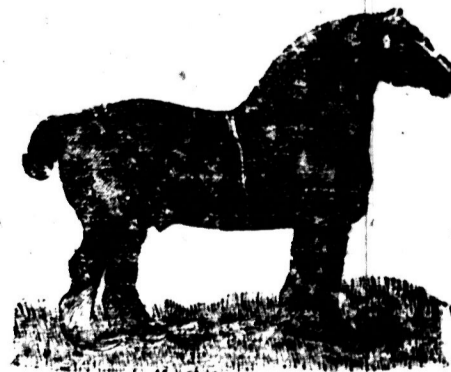
