Patriotic Meeting
Held Thursday Evening

The Patriotic Meeting held in the Music Hall last Thursday evening drew a good sized crowd. The meeting was opened by Dr. Jaques, who in an agreeable speech drew his audience attention swiftly over the different and new phases of the war, the urgency of recruiting and each man's duty to the call of King and Country. Lieutenant Spalding commanding the Jarvis Detail, in a short neat speech described the work of the said Detail during their sojourn here and making an appeal to the young men not already in the King's uniform. In closing he extended, on behalf of the locals detachment, the sincere thanks to all those who in any way helped and to the people of the town in general for the treatment extended to them.

Lt.-Colonel Thompson, who arrived from Cayuga on the evening train, was wildly cheered as he entered the hall. In a rapid, fluent speech he spoke of the sterner and most pressing need of men throughout the Dominion. Speaking as the man who knows, he told of the country's needs. He sketched the life, work and ambitions of the men and officers of his own battalion. He placed the battalion's strength at 838 men, and in closing he made a strong appeal to the men of Jarvis and vicinity to fill up the gap.

Drill exercises by a few of the boys and a few selections by the Band, as well as songs by some of young women of the town, greatly assisted in making the evening a success. The meeting broke up by the singing of the National Anthem.

Rejected men will now be presented by the recruiting depot with a button and a certificate, which will be evidence that the owner offered himself as a soldier and was rejected. The buttons are issued for the purpose of facilitating recruiting. The letters "A. R." (Applied and Rejected) are printed in red upon the button, with the numbers underneath.

Gunner H. Ivey Pays Supreme Sacrifice

The following extract on the death of Gunner Henry Ivey, which was taken from the Cobourg papers, of last week, will doubtless prove interesting to many of our readers. Gunner Ivey who is a grandson of the late Henry Ivey, of Jarvis, visited in this vicinity in his early youth, and will be remembered by some of the older residents of the village.

Cobourg World

Very deep and very general has been the sorrow in town since Saturday evening when the sad news was first received that Gunner Henry Ivey, who was one of our popular young men, a bright student and a favorite with all, went overseas with the first draft from Cobourg Heavy Battery and had been for some months at the front. Previous to enlisting he was a member of the local branch of the Dominion Bank staff, and gave promise of a useful and successful career in his chosen vocation. Almost immediately upon the outbreak of war and the call for recruits, although but a boy in years, he was strongly desirous of doing his part in the Empire's terrible struggle. Accordingly he joined the draft from Cobourg Heavy Battery and proceeded with them overseas, and has taken a strong man's part in the fight for freedom, honor and justice for some months with his unit on the fighting line. That he has been out just in the beginning of his stalwart young manhood has occasioned widespread sorrow and regret, although there is mingled with it pride because another Cobourg boy has died gloriously upon the field of honour, and is numbered among the heroes who have borne so gloriously a part in our nation's history and destiny.

With Dr. and Mrs. Ivey and their family a sympathy too profound for words is felt. None outside of the home circle can apprehend the loss or fathom the grief. That the Allfather may comfort them in their sorrow is the prayer of many, and that the God of battles may hasten the day when a glorious peace shall take the place of this cruel war, is the cry wrung from many hearts by this most sad fatality.

Cobourg Sentinel-Star

On Sunday evening a cablegram was received from Major Wm. Beattie, Senior Chaplain of the second Canadian Division, stating that Gunner Henry Ivey had been killed the previous day, April 28. No particulars were received nor have any been received yet.

Henry Donly Ivey is the elder son of Dr. and Mrs. J. A. Ivey, of Cobourg, and was in his nineteenth year. He was borne and lived all his life here, receiving his education at the Public School and Collegiate Institute. About two years ago he entered the Dominion Bank, and was in the Cobourg Branch when he enlisted here with the Heavy Battery on May 21, 1915, under Lt.-Col. Odell. He was the last and youngest Cobourg boy to be taken on the strength of this crack corps, and the first in the Battery to give his all for King and Country. Of a happy and genial disposition he had a host of friends, and the news of his death cast a pall over the town. To his parents and family go the heart-felt sympathy of all.

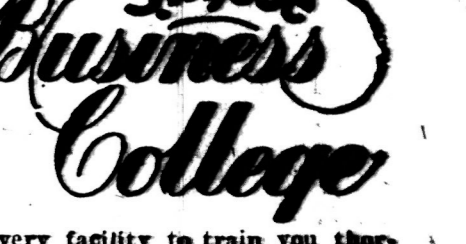
