## Sock Knitting.

The following note on how to finish off the toe of socks being knitted for the soldiers by the ladies of the Haldimand Sock Batt. will be of interest to the workers and satisfaction to the Committee in charge.

**TOE**—Divide the 48 stitches between the three needles, 23 on each. 1st row—Knit together 1st and 2nd stitches on each needle. 2nd row—Knit together 2nd and 3rd stitches on each needle. 3rd row—Knit together 3rd and 4th stitches on each needle. And so on, beginning again with 1st and 2nd stitches after reaching the last stitches on each needle. Decrease to nine stitches. Draw wool through stitches, and darn in carefully.

# FOR OVERSEAS CONSTRUCTION



**G**IGANTIC steam shovels weighing sixty-five tons each, capable of eating up the earth at the rate of 150 to 200 cubic yards an hour, and self propelling extension track pile drivers, are part of the equipment recently purchased by the Government for Col. C. W. P. Ramsay, of the Canadian Overseas Railway Construction Corps. This plant was selected by Col. Ramsay's colleagues in the Engineering Department of the Canadian Pacific Railway and is being prepared by that company at the request of the Government for shipment abroad. The Canadian Overseas Railway Construction Corps has already built many miles of track at strategic points and is all the while engaged in surveys for further construction. The work has often to be done under fire, and though there have been so many narrow escapes there have been no serious casualties. Out of the non-commissioned officers and sappers that enlisted on the foundation of the Corps 18 have already received commissions in the Royal Engineers, a remarkable tribute to their efficiency, while Col. Ramsay and Major Harvey have been mentioned in dispatches. The splendid work of these Canadian engineers has been highly appreciated by the allied commanders.



## A Machine Gun Section For The 114th Battalion

Lieut. B. G. Fleming, of Cayuga, and Sergt. W. N. Bennick, of Dunnville, have returned from their course in machine gun training at the Exhibition Camp, Toronto, and a Machine Gun Section is to be organized in the battalion as soon as possible.

Machine-Gunning is undoubtedly the most interesting of all arms of the service, and besides receiving instruction in the Machine Guns themselves the Gunners are trained in Signalling, Bombing, Scouting, Range-finding and many other subjects which compel the attention of their Students on account of their interesting nature.

The men of this section are permitted to wear a special distinguishing Badge, and are not required to do Guard, Picquet or Fatigue duties either whilst in training or at the front; and when actually on service are only required to be in the Trenches at such times as it is necessary for them to be for the purpose of operating the guns. These privileges give them more leisure than falls to the lot of the ordinary "Tommy" and are much appreciated by those who enjoy them.

Thirty men are required immediately to qualify as Gunners, etc. for this detachment and on account of the specialized nature of this work only men of good education and physique and of a high standard of morals can be accepted as recruits.

This gives many who have been waiting the opportunity to get into a "Corps d'elite" the chance they have long looked for.

## Mrs. Julia Henshaw

It is not often that a woman is elected a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society, but the explorations made in the Canadian Rockies in search of wild flowers by Mrs. Julia Henshaw deserved exceptional recognition. Her book "Wild Flowers of the North American Mountains," with its beautifully colored plates should become a classic, with the further advantage of being a popular classic owing to the method of arrangement. The flowers are grouped by colors, or section being devoted to White, Green and Brown flowers, another Pink and Red flowers, a third Blue flowers, and a fourth Yellow to Orange.

Mrs. Henshaw, in addition to her botanical studies is one of the leading spirits in the Daughters of the Empire, and was sent last December by Sir Sam Hughes as a Captain in the Canadian Army on a special mission to England and France connected with the distribution of Christmas gifts to the troops at the Front.
