Unique Departure

One of the most unique departures as
well as the proudest and, in all likelihood,
the last from the village, took place last
Thursday afternoon, when the people of
Jarvis and vicinity turned out en masse,
and gave the 114th Detail, stationed here, a
rousing send-off. The soldiers who have
been stationed here for the best part of
the winter, received orders recently to
mobilize in Cayuga, and in order to show
their appreciation of the fine bunch of
fellows of the said detail, the citizens
assisted them in their departure, in a
royal fashion, beyond the dreams of the
promoters. The detail assembled in
heavy marching order in the business
section of the town and marched to the
station, headed by the Jarvis Band, and
followed by a great number of automo-
biles, which carried a large part of the
citizens. On arriving at the station, a
number of the citizens addressed the de-
parting soldiers, wishing them God speed,
health and a safe return. Lieut. Spald-
ing, on behalf of the men, answered in
fitting manner, thanking the people for
their kindness during their stay here.
The following were the speakers: Revs.
Rosa, Foote, and McCarter, and Messrs.
McCarter, Dr. Jacques, M.P.P. R. A.
McCarter acted as chairman, in place
of the Reeve, Mr. Holmes, who was un-
able to be present. Great credit was due
to the committee in charge, Messrs. Parkin-
son and R. A. McCarter as it was
through their efforts that the demonstra-
tion of good will was a success.

Will present the Colors

A beautiful stand of colors has been
presented to the 114th by Mrs. and Miss
Margaret Thompson, wife and daughter
of Lieut. Colonel Thompson, both daughters
of Haldimand, the one by adoption and
the other by birth.
"Colors" are something with which the
people of Haldimand are not familiar, be-
cause rifle regiments never carry them,
and the 37th Haldimand Rifles was a rifle
regiment. A few words of explanation,
then, are in order.
The Colors consist of two flags, the one
known as the King's Colour, and the other
the Regimental Color. They represent
the honor of the Battalion, and are always
greatly cherished by its corps. Many a
brave man has given his life to save the
colors, and many another has won distinc-
tion by wearing a set from the enemy.
Old churches, public halls, museums,
etc., in great Britain, are thickly adorned
by colors taken in many a noted British
war, besides which it is customary to de-
posit colors in Cathedrals and Churches
when they have grown too old and tatter-
ed for further use. Upon them is em-
broided the names of battles in which the
corps possessing them has been engaged,
with distinction—"Battle honours" as they
are known, and perhaps when these come
back to Haldimand, the war over, they
too will be adorned with proud historic
names. Stringent rules and regulations
are laid down for these military flags,
and they must be made of the heaviest
possible silk, three feet nine inches long,
by three feet broad, surrounded by a
beautiful gold fringe.
The King's Color is the Union Jack
embroidered in the centre with the King's
Crown and a part of the regimental crest.
The Regimental Color is of dark blue, and
is embroidered the full regimantal crest.
Rules are laid down too,
for the exact shades and colors of the
silk to be used in the embroidery, and on-
ly an expert is really capable of producing
an absolutely correct set. The work is in
the hands of Mrs. Malone, of Ottawa, a
lady who has produced numbers of very
beautiful specimens for other corps. It
will take her with an assistant, six weeks
of steady labour to finish the task.
The presentation of colors is always a
great day in the history of a corps. When
the Haldimand Battalion has been togeth-
er to become fairly well drilled, it is the
intention to have a ceremonial, and big
excursions will be run from all parts of
Haldimand, so that the people may see
their very best.

Death and Burial of Gunner H. Ivey



Letters have been received from Chap-
lain Major Beattie, and Lieut. Cecil Peter,
giving facts concerning the passing of
Gunner Henry Ivey, of this town.
On the morning of the 8th, Henry was
on duty as aeroplane scout, shortly before
six o'clock, Mr. MacKeen (his section offi-
cer) and I were awakened by the bursting
of a shell close at hand. Everything was
made ready to get out if necessary.
While things were being fixed, another
shell came over, and then I noticed Henry
under cover near the window. We asked
him where that had landed, and he told
us. Mr. MacKeen and I started to leave
the room together, when another landed
and we both rushed out and found Henry
being supported by the Sergeant-Major and
another chap. MacKeen was ahead of me.
He felt the pulse at once but it had stop-
ped. He never spoke to a soul. A splin-
ter of shell entered just below, and must
have pierced the heart. Through your
grief you have the comfort of the knowl-
edge that his was not a painful passing,
but a merciful release, which our heav-
enly Father sees fit to grant to some.
Henry was always ready with a cheery
word and a helping hand. As an aero-
plane scout, at which he was employed,
he more than excelled. His was the most
accurate judgement of any scout I have
seen in the matter of spotting a hostile
craft. And he was always on the job.
With a scout like that out there, who is
who is accurate in judgment, always
careful and trustworthy, as was Henry,
his value to the unit is priceless. His
was a position of trust, and he did his
duty—none can do more. He was good
and true.
The burial had to be after dark, and
without lights. The grave was dug by
kindly Cobourg hands, while every Co-
bourg boy who could be spared, bowed
down his head with grief at the burial.
It was a bright starlight night, without
moon. The German flares lit east a
flicker over the scene. While I was re-
spectfully the words, "Lord, Thou has
been our dwelling place in all genera-
tions," and had come to the words, "And
as a watch in the night," a star shot
across the sky straight before me, then
another and a third, and the old saying,
"Every time a star falls a soul returns to
God," came back to me, and I thought of
the moment of your fall. Then we prayed
prayer for his soul, that it may rest in
Him, prayed for you all, that you may
find consolation in Him, and for ourselves,
that we may find peace and protection in
Him.
It would have done you good to have
heard him speak of Henry and how
he conducted himself. He was evidently
simply loved by everybody.
We laid his body to rest in a little mili-
tary cemetery, where lie none but the
heroes who have given their lives for
others.
The following letter was received from
Bomb. Maurice J. Gormly, of the 2nd
Heavy Battery written on behalf of the
Battery, to Dr. and Mrs. J. A. Ivey, con-
cerning the death of their son, Gunner
Henry Ivey:
Dear Doctor and Mrs. Ivey:
On behalf of the Battery I write this
letter of respect for your gallant son Hen-
ry, who heroically met his death while on
duty. His death is felt by all who knew
him, for he was looked upon as a good
soldier, and admired by all who knew him.
He was a brave warrior, and a true friend.
I and myself to a little grave yard not
far from our position, when our good
Chaplain, Major Beattie, came many miles
at nine o'clock p.m. and directed the ser-
vices. He sprinkled the dust of another
earth, "earth to earth, ashes to ashes,
dust to dust." We parted leaving to rest
our brave warrior in a little grave
yard far off Belgium.
How many more shall pay the utmost
price, no one can possibly say, but this
we be hath not sacrificed in vain, who
hath laid down his life, "for Greater love
hath no man than this, that a man lay
down his life for his friends."
All the Battery boys go nightly and at-
tend to the fixing of his grave and you
may rest assured that it will be ever look-
ed after, so long as we are in the country.
It was a splinter of a shell that caused
it all. He suffered not, and passed quiet-
ly, with a smile on his lips.

Sad Death of Mrs. W. Mason

The sudden calling by death of Evelyn
May Sowter, only daughter of Mr. and
Mrs. Wm. Sowter of this town, and be-
loved wife of Mr. Waddington Mason,
Toronto, startled and cast a gloom over
our town and community when it became
known and she was lying at the point
of death and later, of her demise.
Mrs. Mason, who on account of ill
health, due to asthma, from which she
has suffered for a number of years, had
been staying with her mother for several
weeks. Although ailing, nothing serious
was expected until Saturday morning
about one o'clock when Mr. Sowter, hav-
ing gone into her room, found her uncon-
scious. Medical aid was quickly summoned
and everything done to restore her to con-
sciousness, but in spite of all efforts she
passed away in the afternoon about three
o'clock.
Mrs. Mason was born in this town on
May 12, 1855, and spent her life until her
marriage in this place. In early girlhood
she took up the study of music for which
she had a natural aptitude, passing her
examinations while still young and being
very successful as a teacher. While never
very strong, her disposition was such as
to excite admiration by all those who
came in touch with her. She was an ar-
dent worker in the Anglican Church, of
which she was a life member. On Dec.
29, 1912, she was united in marriage to
Waddington Mason, to which union one
child was given, Doris, of two and a
half years. Since her marriage she has
resided in Toronto.
The funeral which was held from her
parents residence on Tuesday afternoon
last at two o'clock, to St. Paul's church
for service and interment, was one of the
largest ever witnessed here, showing the
esteem in which the deceased was held.
The service was conducted by the Rev.
J. H. Ross, who paid fitting tribute to the
late Mrs. Mason's character.

Mrs. Mason leaves to mourn her loss,
besides a host of admirers, her husband

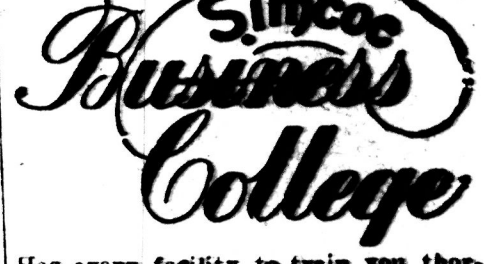
