### Fire at Waterford

Waterford, Oct. 26-Fire destroyed the York Block, corner of Main and Alice Streets. Waterford. early this morning. The engineer of a through frieght train blew the alarm and Night Watchman W. Craggs, took up the signal at 3.30 a.m., locating the fire in the rear of H. A. Sanderson's general store. The village has only a hand pump and owing to delay in getting the fire hose through under the railway tracks, to the river, the flames were beyond control of the brigade. The block, a two-storey solid brick walls sprung and fell in the intense heat and and the post office adjoining became so bulged wirh the inteuse heat that Postmaster Savage locked the doors and denied the public entrance. #### A Letter from France

Mr. C. Rodgers, of the Record staff re cently received a letter from Pte. A. G. Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Smith of this place, who is with the Machine and the Lord's Prayer, several items of Gun Service of the 7th Batt., C. E. F., somewhere in France, A.G., as he is commonly known, enlisted with one of the Western Battalions, and his letter is interesting, though brief. An extract of the letter follows.

"We have just come back from the front line after 10 days stay and I reckon we needed a rest for I never felt tougher in all my life. Never slept for the last three days or nights and never had a wash for the whole time, nor was our boots or putties off. Lived on bully beef and hard How to make the best of our present day good at times, but the water was scarce and we could only eat when we had it.

We have a dandy battalion, none bet ter I could swear right now for the shell holes in this house sure do not help to keep out the rain and it is dripping all over the room, but we should worry We have two overcoats among five, lost ours on way in and brought out a German one and three ground tents. There goes those fight better than the Germans.

We were in a big advance this time and our Co'y, afterwards had to clean out part of new trench to left still held by the Germans. We sure had a warm time. We only had one gun amongst two crews, so some of us went ahead bombing and we chased old Fritz 400 yards up the
