Nanticoke

A "Memorial Service" will be held at Christ Church, Nanticoke, Sunday, November 26th, for one of our soldier boys, William Lown, who died recently with pneumonia at Bramshott Camp, England.

The ladies of Nanticoke, packed 26 boxes to send to the soldiers as Xmas presents. Each box contained the following:—1 package of wrapping paper, 1 package of envelopes, 1 package of dates, 1 can of cocoa, 1 tin of Campbell's soup, 1 can of condensed milk, 1 tin of iced wafers, 1 package of Spearmint gum, 3 varieties of homemade candy, 1 large piece of Xmas cake, drop cakes, 1 cake toilet soap, 1 shaving stick and kisses. The total cost of the contents and postage amounted to over \$80.00 and were sent to the this neighborhood who have enlisted for Overseas Service.

Wholesale Depletion

Judging from the unprecedented heavy deliveries of poultry on the central eastern markets so early in the season it would appear that farmers and producers generally are not only depleting their flocks unwarrantably but also rushing them to the market in an unfinished condition. As a result, the current price of chickens is much below normal value at the present time, in comparison with the price of other meats. This is directly due to the overloading of the market.

With the brisk inquiry for Canadian poultry from Great Britain, it is expected by exporters that the demand for well-finished, good quality stock will be very keen during the coming winter. Besides there will be a good demand for home consumption. The price for well-finished birds continues firm, but with so much poor stock arriving wholly unsuited for either storage or export, many buyers have recently reduced their quotations for all low grades.

The presence of pullets and young fowl has also been noted in many shipments. This is most unfortunate considering the price of eggs. The very firm prospect for the profitable marketing of all poultry points to the necessity of conserving in every possible way all suitable laying and breeding stock. Unless this is done, there will be but little poultry left in a short time.

Sudden Decease

The sudden decease of Mr. John Crawford, of this place, this afternoon, Wednesday, cast a gloom over the entire community. For some time past Mr. Crawford was not feeling his usual self and had been treating with his physician for his heart. This afternoon, when in feeling another attack coming he went to the office of Dr. Newell and while there suddenly dropped dead.

Mr. Crawford, who for the past few years has been employed by the G.T.R., tending the road gates, will be greatly missed by the whole community, being one of the oldest residents of this place. The family have the sympathy of the whole village in their sad bereavement.

Indians Don Warpaint

Ottawa, Nov. 19.—Indians are increasing in Canada and are serving in large numbers at the front. These two interesting facts are disclosed by the annual report of the Indians by the Government.

That report shows that an increase of 2,000 in the number of Indians brings the total of aborigines to 105,561. It also shows that 1,200 full blooded Indians of Canada are wearing khaki and carrying rifles.

In some cases the military performance of the Indians is striking. The report shows that more than more than half of the 114th (the Halton Rifles) are Indians of Eastern Ontario. In the Bull Moose battalion (number 52nd Ontario) there are 65 Indians. The Bruce battalion has 65 Indians from the Cape Crocker reserve. This includes practically the population of military age, for there are only 107 in the band between the ages of 21 and 65. The 135th (Middlesex) has many Braves too. 30 Indians walked in from remote regions about Hudson Bay to enlist. Ontario has sent 902, Quebec 101, Manitoba 89, Saskatchewan 57, Prince Edward Island 24, British Columbia 17, Nova Scotia 14, New Brunswick 12, Alberta 9 and the Yukon 2 Indians. By no means are all of the Indians in the ranks. There is a fair sprinkling of qualified officers, including Capt. George Smith of the 4th Battalion (Ormore Picard of the 12th, Capt. Charles Smith of the 114th, Lieut. Cameron Brant of the 4th (killed at Ypres), Lieut. Millen Martin, James D. Morse, John R. Stacey and C. A. Cooke, of the 114th.

Lieut. Brant was the great-great-grand-son of the historic Joseph Brant, who served the British cause so well in the American revolution of 1776. Pte. Belanger, an Indian serving in the 52nd won Military Cross.

The report declares that the Indians at the front have shown bravery, intelligence and endurance, and have particularly excelled as sharpshooters. With money as well as men have the Indians been generous to the cause. They have given \$5000 to the Patriotic, Red Cross and Belgian Relief funds. The possession of wealth has not been the limit of generosity, for the Chippewas of Caradoc, the Mohawks of the Bay of Quinte, the Ojibways and other Rice Lake Bands offered contributions which the department would not allow to be too poor.
