Presentation of Colors

To use the expression of a Caledonia citizen "This is the day we get on the map." Caledonia was on the map yesterday and the reason for it was the presentation of the colors to the 114th Battalion.

This is an occasion that a town rarely has the opportunity of celebrating, and one which Caledonia and the people of Haldimand may never have the chance of witnessing again. Consequently it was a large crowd that greeted the boys when they detrained at 11.30. Forming in marching order they marched to the Agriculture Park. The ladies of Caledonia had lunch ready for the soldiers, lunch in plenty and to spare.

The troops were then formed up in a hollow square facing the river. The color bearers were Lieuts. W. Thompson and Martin. After the Bugle Bands drums had been stacked in a star form the colors were laid upon them and the Dedication service was read by Chaplain Lyons of the Battalion.

This was the solemn part of the service when the colors, the emblem of the honor of the battalion, were dedicated to the honor of God and prayers for their safety and honorable care were offered.

Then Mrs. Thompson and Miss Thompson were escorted to the colors by Majors Davis and Cowie, and the colors were placed by them in the keeping of the officers named.

Col. Thompson then introduced P. R. Lator, M.P., and Mr. Thos. Marshall, M. P.P. The first gentleman, in well chosen words, spoke of what the honor of the battalion was to the county. He hoped that the colors would lead them to victory. "We are proud of you, men, proud of you, wherever you are."

Mr. Marshall said that we are all proud to welcome some of the finest soldiers in Canada. It is a time of sacrifice and the soldiers and civilians are making it. He wished the battalion God speed and a safe return. Col. Thompson referred to the order to go overseas. He said that he was pleased to be there, pleased at the entertainment provided for the men by the ladies of Caledonia and he assured the people of Haldimand that wherever the battalion might be their hearts would always turn to the land from which they went.

We worship no idols, said the Colonel, but the Colors stand for the honor of Brock's Rangers, the King's Colors with the Union Jack and the Battalion Colors with the Maple Leaf, and the words "For King and Country" the cross of the old 37th. The Crossed Tomahawks were emblematic of the other name "Brock's Rangers" for the grandfathers of the Indians of the 114th had fought and Brock in that notable battle where Brock had fallen.

He paid glowing tributes to Lieuts. Montour and Emih to Lieuts. Heslail and Howars—men of Haldimand County who had already done notable work in the service of their country.

He added a word to the mothers whose boys were going overseas. They would think they had little to be thankful on Thanksgiving Day but they had, in that they had sons noble enough to be willing to go.

The march past then took place and the ceremony was closed by the band playing the National Anthem.

But the unique part of the ceremony was yet to come for the Indian women, not to be outdone by their white sisters, had with their own hands embroidered a banner for the Indian soldiers of the battalion. This banner was presented by Mrs. E. S. Baxter, while Mrs. Amelia Garlow daughter of the late Chief Jesiah Hill, read an address of presentation. Mrs. Simon Hill, who helped embroider the colors assisted in the ceremony.

The colors were on red silk and contained the tokens of the several tribes composing the Six Nations. The crest is surmounted by the British Lion while a wreath of entwined pine, Oak and Maple emblems of the Six Nations: England and Canada surrounded the Bear on the pine sticks six arrows were the entwined white underparts of the nation. The animals represented were the bear, the wolf, the hare, the tortoise and the heron, as Judge Hardy, of Brantford, afterwards explained, as the totems from which all other totems descended. The banner was certainly a work of art and a credit to the women of the Reserve.

Dedication Service similar to the others were read and after playing the National Anthem the soldiers marched to the station and entrained to the several points in the county.

The day was an ideal one and thousands were present to witness a ceremony unique in the annals of Haldimand's history.
