Word was received to-day of the death of Roland Boyd, who died at his home in London, aged 55 years, on Tuesday evening. The funeral will be held in Simcoe on Friday, September 8th, on the arrival of the noon train.

Mr. Boyd was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Boyd, formerly of this place, and spent his boyhood here. He leaves to mourn his loss a widow and one son, who will have the sympathy of all who knew him in their sad bereavement.

**Sad Fatality**

A very distressing and intensely sad accident occurred Monday afternoon about half past one at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jno. Bousfield of Walpole, when Orville, the third son, met with a fatal accident.

The young man was operating a house, one of the team being a young colt which was being broke in to heavy work, and it is supposed that for some unknown reason it became frightened causing the team to break into a run. In crossing a deep ditch the young man was thrown from his seat, and either from the fall or his head coming in contact with one of the wheels, his skull became badly crushed.

Mrs. Bousfield, who was in the orchard at the time, saw her son fall from his seat, and together with her youngest son, Earl, who was in the drive shed, started for the scene.

When they arrived the unfortunate man was unconscious, never regaining consciousness. Although Dr. Newell was immediately summoned, life became extinct before medical aid could reach him.

The young man, who was in his 25th year, was liked by all who new him, and will be greatly missed by the community at large.

Besides his mother and father, who have the intense sympathy of the neighborhood, he leaves to mourn his loss, three brothers and one sister, besides a host of admiring friends.
