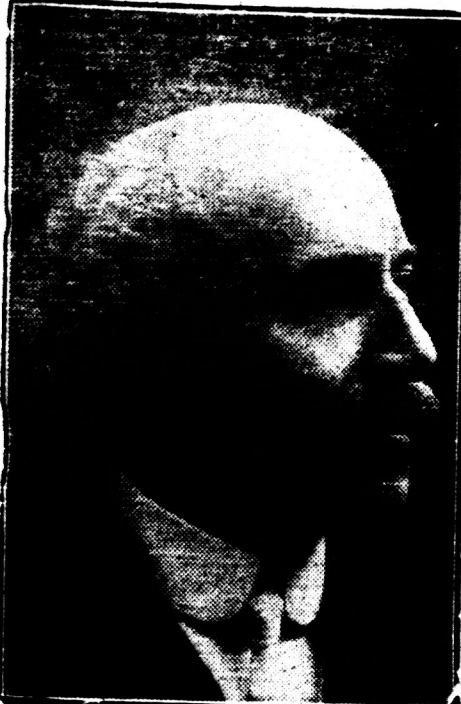

Vegetarian Dinner
Tomato Soup
Radishes
Celery
Maitre d'Hotel Potatoes, Creamed Cauliflower
Green Pepper and Celery Salad, Coffee.
This was a dinner entirely made up of vegetables that Miss Foote served in the vegetable section of the Department of Agriculture's exhibit in the Government Building at the Exhibition yesterday.
The tomato soup was made of strained tomatoes added to a white stock and seasoned.
The radishes were cut into rose-like shapes.
MOCK VEAL CUTLETS.
The mock veal cutlets, whose food value is as great as that of Hamburg steak, were made of one and one half cups of cooked white beans mashed to a smooth pulp and seasoned with pepper and salt, and three tablespoons of tomato sauce. This was made into cutlet shapes, dipped in egg and breadcrumbs and sautéed in butter.
These looked very pretty served with a garnish of endive and small tomatoes cut into decorative shapes. The cauliflower was broken into flowerets and served with a white sauce. The potatoes, cut into little balls with a vegetable cutter.

Duck Season Open
The following are extracts of game laws and regulations insofar as they relate to the present season and to this district:
DUCKS—Open season from the 1st day of September to the 31st day of December, both days inclusive. Bay limit, 200 ducks per season.
GEESE and SWANS—Sept. 15th to 30th day of April, 1917, both days inclusive.
SNIFE—Sept. 1st to Dec. 31st, inclusive.
The purchase or sale of wild ducks, wild geese, or other water fowl is prohibited.
Shooting between sunset and sunrise is forbidden.
No person domiciled in the province of Ontario for a period of less than six months, shall hunt, take, kill, wound or destroy any animal or bird or carry or use any gun or rifle for such purposes, except under the authority of a license.
No person who has taken or killed any bird or animal suitable for food shall allow the flesh thereof to be destroyed or spoiled, and no person who has taken a fur-bearing animal shall allow the skin thereof to be destroyed or spoiled.
Hunters should make themselves familiar with the law copies of which can be obtained from any of the game inspectors, in order to prevent any mistake.

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A New Postage Stamp

Considerable complaint having been made as to the difficulty experienced in distinguishing between the ordinary two-cent postage stamp and the two-cent postage and war tax stamp, it has been decided to issue a new stamp of the value of two cents surcharge in a manner similar to the one in use, the only difference being in color, which is brown.
