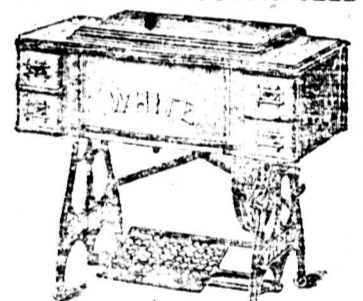

County Council

(Concluded from last week)
West Sandling Camp, Kent, Eng., Jan. 13, 1916.
Harrison Arrel, Esq., Barrister, Etc., Caledonia, Ont., Canada.
My Dear Mr. Arrel—Your letter of December 18, was awaiting me here on my return from France, where I had been on an instructional tour for 16 days, part of the time within 200 yards of the German trenches, and most of it where the shells were flying overhead pretty regularly day and night. It was the hardest tour I ever made in my life, but of absorbing interest, none the less.

Re the band instruments. Our band has been kept together, and I have a promise that it will so continue. Meantime the instruments are in use and well cared for, which is much better than having them stored. It is, and always has been my intention to watch over these instruments and see that they go back to Canada, but so long as the band remains intact there is no possible chance of getting them back.

The articles sold, to which you allude were only such as were not allowed to take overseas. We got a fair price, and every cent of the money went to pay Italian debts, which had to be liquidated before leaving Canada. I was advised, and assisted throughout by Majors Davison and Cowles and all the senior officers, and when the good time of our return comes, we shall be only too glad to meet our generous friends, the county councillors and give an account of our stewardship. Meantime, let me just add that all our financial matters are subject to the most rigid military audit and that we could not perpetrate an irregularity even were we inclined to do so.

I would be glad to have read this letter to the county council and to wish its members, from all the officers and men of the 114th, a happy and prosperous new year.

Gentlemen—We your road and bridge committee beg leave to report as follows:

First—Re Meadows Bridge: would recommend some grading and filling in of holes which would be necessary as soon as said work can be performed.

Second—Re town Line Bridge on Robinson Road: would recommend some filling on east approach, which is needed.

Third—Would recommend the road and bridge committee purchase 3000 feet, 3 inches thick; of white oak plank from A. & W. J. Bailey, Hagersville: 2000 ft., 16 ft. long, 1000 feet, 14 ft. long at \$42.00 per M. feet and same to be delivered at the nearest point when delivered.

Fourth—Would recommend that the road and bridge committee examine all county bridges and report at the next meeting of the Council.
