**Cyclone Strikes Woodhouse**

Mr. George O. Boughner, who lives at  
Lot 11, in the 5th concession of Wood-  
house, it roused the house, took a roof  
off one barn, blew the doors of another in  
damaged the silo, smashed up a number  
of trees and generally made its power  
most unpleasantly felt. Mr. Boughner's  
loss is estimated at something like \$2,000.  
Further east Mr. Hamilton Butler had a  
barn unroofed.—Reformer.

**Treat for Smut**

Many thousands of bushels of oats are  
are lost annually due to the ravages of  
smut. This waste can be largely elimi-  
nated by the proper treatment of seed.  
The method usually adopted is as follows:  
Mix one pint of formalin with 40 gal-  
lons of water or two table spoons full to  
one gal of water. Place grain to be  
treated in a heap on clean canvas on floor  
Sprinkle the formalin solution over the  
grain, the solution, then shovel. Repeat  
this until every grain is moistened by so-  
lution, then cover. Pile with sacking and  
leave three or four hours. At the end of  
this time spread grain to dry; shovelling  
it over three or four times will hasten the  
drying.

Many men are of the opinion that it  
will be unnecessary for them to treat their  
oats for smut this Spring, believing that  
the treatment last year will suffice for  
several years. This is an error that  
should be corrected as oats treated last  
year are not in way guaranteed to be free  
from smut this year or succeeding years.  
The disease can only be stamped out by  
every farmer treating for several years.
