Reported Missing

Pte. John Wilson, who is recently reported missing, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. John Wilson, of Rockford. He enlisted with the Royal Canadian Dragoons and has been in France for some time over a year.

Newspaperman Dies In Empire's Service

Lieut. William Maunsell Scanlan, son of Rev. R. W. Scanlan, Port Elgin, is officially reported to have died of wounds on April 10. Although the telegram to his father from "the records gives few particulars, it is believed the gallant young officer fell in the charge of the Canadians at Vimy Ridge.

With Maunsell Scanlan's death there passes one of the brightest newspapermen known to Canadian journalism. In 1907 he served with distinction on the staff of the News, Toronto, representing that daily on many important political, police and other assignments throughout Ontario, and later in press gallery of the Legislature. He entered the newspaper field in Montreal in 1909, but when the war broke out in 1914 was working in Regina, and at once enlisted in the 5th (Saskatchewan) Battalion, C.E.F. He won corporal's chevrons at Ypres, last year became sergeant, and only a few weeks ago was given his commission for service in the field.

After serving with such a battalion as the 5th for two years and a half without a wound, the news of Mr. Scanlan's death came as a great shock to friends and relatives. Only recently an application was made through Ottawa to the war office to obtain a short leave in Canada for him, but the necessary committee had not been granted.

Mr. Scanlan was a young man of genial disposition, a talented musician, and keenly interested in amateur theatricals, and for a time during the strain of trench warfare on the west front in the winter of 1915 his services were requisitioned to help relieve the monotony and cheer up the men in billets by organizing entertainments.—London Advertiser.

The late Lieut. Scanlan was at one time resident of Jarvis, his father being minister of the Methodist church here from 1901 to 1903.

Capt. Paulin's Body Brought Home To Simcoe

The remains of Captain A. H. Paulin of the 3rd Reserve Battalion, who died in England of pneumonia some weeks ago, arrived in Simcoe at noon on Friday last. Internment took place on Monday at 3 p.m. with military honors. Capt. Paulin was attached to the local volunteer militia regiment, and went over to England with the understrength 133rd Battalion, after the breaking up of which he was put in charge of D. Company of the 3rd Reserve.

Died from Wounds

According to the List of casualties as published in Monday's papers, another Caledonia soldier has given his life for King and Country in the person of Pte. H. Buntin, who was reported as having died of wounds, although no official notification has as yet been received by his wife. Pte. Buntin went overseas with the 114th Battalion, and is the first death reported. His wife and one child reside in this village.—Sachem.
