Respected Citizen Passes

In the passing of Geo. Dennis, whose death occurred on Tuesday last, Walpole loses one of its most respected citizens. Born on August 15th, 1859, he was the son of the late John Dennis of Walpole. When still a youth he joined the Methodist church to which he remained a constant and faithful member all through his life, winning the respect of those who came in contact with him by his quiet, retiring disposition and upright character.

In 1883 he was united in marriage to Letitia J., eldest daughter, of the late Michael Quinn. He resided on his farm in Walpole until some six months before his demise, when owing to ill health he was forced to give up active work, moving to this place and purchasing and occupying the residence of Mr. J. A. Burwash. While residing in Jarvis his health has not been of the best and for the past few weeks has been forced to his bed, his condition gradually becoming worse and on Tuesday last the vital spark fled.

The funeral took place from his late residence on Thursday afternoon to the Methodist church Jarvis the service being taken by the Rev. J. G. Foote, with interment to the Nanticoke Union Cemetery.

The late Mr. Dennis leaves to mourn his loss, besides a sorrowing widow, a son Roger of Nanticoke, a daughter Alice at home, and three sisters, Mrs. A. Smith and Miss Harriet, of Beaton, and Mrs. W. Tennant, of Wheatley, Ont. The many beautiful floral offerings testified to the high esteem the late Mr. Dennis was held.

Death of Mrs. Wm. Porter

Another respected resident of Jarvis passed away on Thursday last, April 19th, in the person of Mrs. Wm. Porter, who was in her 64th year.

Mrs. Porter had been in failing health, due to a stroke, for the past four years for the past four months has been confined to her bed, gradually becoming weaker until Thursday last she passed peacefully away.

The late Mrs. Porter was the second daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Hanna, of Walpole, and spent her early life in this township. In 1871 she was united in marriage to Mr. Wm. Porter to which union four children were born, namely, Ed. of Winnipeg, Miss Lillian, at home, Mrs. Ed. Clark, Winnipeg and Mrs. A. Williamson at home.

The funeral, which was largely attended, took place on Monday last, service being at the house with interment to the Knox Church cemetery.

The bereaved family have the deep sympathy of the entire community.

Local Casualties

During the past few days word has been received that a number of local boys have been wounded in action and one has paid the supreme sacrifice in the person of Pte. Andrew Doughty, son of Wm. Doughty, of Walpole, word being received on Monday last that he has been killed on April 9th.

On Monday Nyeve Smith received word that his son has been wounded in the wrist. A G. who is attached to a machine gun squad, has been on the firing line continually all through the long fall and winter months and his many friends will wish him a speedy recovery.

William Kindry, Walpole, also received word on Monday that his son Bert had been wounded in the hip. Bert enlisted at Jarvis with the 114th batt. last spring, remaining with that battalion during the necessary training at Camp Borden and in England recently being sent on draft to France.

Saturday brought a wire to Garnet that Ptes. Allan J. Phillips, son of Joseph Phillips, and H. Close had been wounded. These young men became attached to the 114th at Hagersville.

On Monday the name of Pte. Ernest Hayne was listed as wounded. He enlisted with the 114th at this place and prior to which he was in the employ of John Shaw. We presume the above mentioned boys were in the attack on Vimy Ridge.

Paid Supreme Sacrifice

The community has again had the price of victory brought home to them when word was received on Monday last that Pte. Andrew Doughty, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Doughty, of Walpole, had given his life for King and Country, he having died on the 9th of this month, Easter Monday, we presume with the Canadian attack and victory on Vimy Ridge.

Andrew enlisted with the Hagersville detail of the 114th in the early part of last spring, going with that battalion to England and later being sent with a draft to France. Of a quiet and retiring disposition Pte. Doughty was well and favorably known in Walpole, he and his brother owning and working the farm formerly occupied by Mr. James Cullen. When the battalion was being formed in this county the young lad offered his services. He was an active member of the Young Men's Bible Class of the Jarvis Methodist Church, and being the first of that class to give his life for the cause, although a large number have given their services.

A memorial service will be held in the Methodist church in the near future for the brave young soldier.

Killed in Action

Lieut. Everett Fallis, reported killed in action, was the son of Rev. S. W. Fallis, an old Jarvis boy, who resigned the pastorate of Yonge Street Methodist Church, Toronto, to take charge of the Central Methodist Church at Calgary. He was 21 years of age, and had just matriculated from Mount Royal College, Calgary, when he enlisted as a private and came to Niagara to train. He was given his commission last January.

Nanticoke Boy Honored

Fresh honors heaped upon E. M. Harris, circuit court commissioner of Ogemaw county, Michigan, by the country of his adoption reflect credit and glory upon Nanticoke, his native village, where he has a host of friends and admirers, who will be pleased to hear of the high regard and respect in which he is held, not only in his home city, West Branch, but throughout northern Michigan, where he is well and favorably known.

At the first annual banquet of the Business Men's Association of Ogemaw county recently held in West Branch, Mr. Harris was awarded the distinction of being chosen to deliver the most important speech on the program, the patriotic address, which since the declaration of a state of war between United States and Germany has come to be regarded as the (piece de resistance) of any program of speeches.

Reports of the banquet give considerable prominence to Mr. Harris' address, as a vigorous, eloquent and stirring oration. That the speaker is not merely a "lip patriot" is indicated by advice received, stating that he is giving freely of his time, money and powers of oratory in aiding recruiting throughout the state, being especially active in securing recruits for the American navy. Not content with this patriotic service, he is displaying his loyalty to his adopted flag, the Stars and Stripes, in an even more tangible and self-sacrificing manner, by offering himself for service in the Army there. He expects to be called to the colors at Washington any day now. Truly, Nanticoke has every reason to feel proud of her distinguished son, who, by aiding his adopted country against the Huns, is thereby doing his bit for the flag he was born under, and helping to protect his native village.
