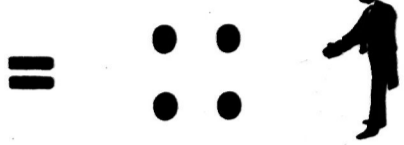

We presume that he was trying to get into fighting trim by participating in a game that is a sixth sense to him.

Preserve Eggs Now

The indications are that eggs will be dearer next winter, dearer than they were last winter so those who want eggs had better put some down while they are comparatively cheap. Do not use oats, bran, salt or other mediums; moreover, the patent preservatives usually advertised as being so simple and effective had better be adopted with caution. Better use something that has been tried and found satisfactory.

According to Dr. Frank T. Shutt, Chemist, lime water is one of the best preservatives and we quote the following from his Exhibition Circular no. 42.

The method of preparation is simply to slake one pound good quick lime with a small quantity of water and then stir the milk of lime so formed into 5 gals. of water. After the mixture has been kept well stirred for a few hours it is allowed to settle. The supernatant liquid, which is now "saturated" limewater, is drawn off and poured over the eggs, previously placed in a crock or water-tight barrel.

As exposure to the air tends to precipitate the lime (as carbonate), and thus weaken the solution, the vessel containing the eggs should be kept covered. The air may be excluded by a covering of sweet oil, or by sacking upon which a paste of lime is spread. If, after a time there is any noticeable precipitation of the lime, the lime-water should be drawn or siphoned off and replaced with a further quantity newly prepared.

General Precautions Necessary to take: It is essential that attention be paid to the following points:—

1. That perfectly fresh eggs only be used.

2. That the eggs throughout the whole period of preservation be completely immersed.

Although not necessary to the preservation of the eggs in a sound condition a temperature of 40 to 45 degrees F. will no doubt materially assist towards retaining good flavor or in arresting that "stale" flavour so often characteristic of packed eggs.

Respecting the addition of salt, it must be stated that our experiments—conducted now throughout fifteen seasons—do not show any benefit to be derived therefrom; indeed, salt frequently imparts a limey flavor to the egg, probably by inducing an interchange of the fluids within and without the egg. Our advice is do not add any salt to the limewater.
