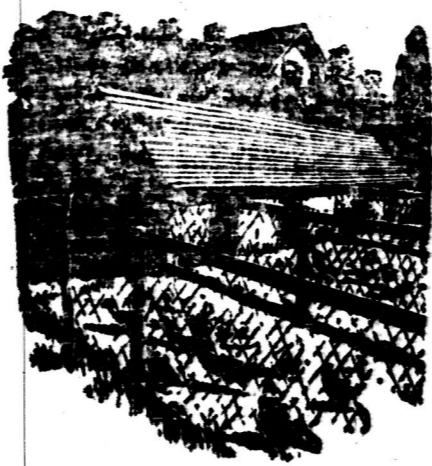

Notice to Creditors

The War Savings Loan

The new War Savings Certificates which have been created by the Government to encourage thrift and economy and to give everyone an opportunity to assist in financing our war expenditure, are now on sale at every bank and money order post office in Canada. The \$25 certificate sells for \$21.50, the \$50 for \$43, and the \$100 for \$81.

As an investment these certificates offer many attractive features, chief of which are the absolute security and the excellent interest return. For every \$21.50 lent to the Government now \$25 will be returned at the end of three years.

There are two other features which are especially interesting to the small investors. First, the certificate may be surrendered anytime, if the buyer should need his money; and second, each certificate is registered at Ottawa in the buyer's name and, if lost or stolen, is therefore valueless to anyone else.

But while they are excellent from an investment standpoint, the certificates should appeal strongly to Canadians because they offer to those who must serve at home an splendid opportunity for most important patriotic service. The person who honestly saves to the extent of his ability and places his savings at the disposal of the Government by purchasing these certificates, may feel that he is having a direct share in feeding, equipping and muniting our Canadian soldiers, who are so nobly doing their part.

Officer Expresses Views

An officer in the Overseas Canadian forces, who is home on short leave, speaking recently before an audience in Toronto said, that a short time ago he had been through villages in Scotland, and they were typical of other places in England and Wales, where not a man of military age could be seen and where the work was done by women, old men and boys. He added that the Canadians in the army wanted peace as much as any one but they were determined, knowing what peace before the accomplishment of their object would be, to go on until the allied aim had been won. The sword would be wrenched from the Kaiser's hand. This officer went on to say, since his return, that so far Canada has felt but the slightest pinch of war, and he urged his hearers to be prepared for far more sacrifices for their own eventual spiritual and material good. These words speak for themselves. We are so far from the scene of action that it takes a decided effort for us to realize all that is involved in the present war. When we think of the villages in Britain that have been swept clear of their men, we hear the call of our own flesh and blood in the trenches to stand by them and realize that in this time of stress and need, a critical period in the war has now arrived when we must sacrifice until we feel it.

Cables for Members of Canadian Expeditionary Force in France

The Department of Militia and Defence reports that considerable delay and confusion frequently results through the improper addressing in care of War Office London, cable messages intended for officers and men serving with the Canadian Expeditionary Force in France. No arrangements exist for the forwarding of such messages from London by telegraph, and it is therefore necessary in all such cases to send them on by post.

All cable messages intended for members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force in France may (like telegrams for others) be sent from Canada addressed directly to France, the addresses of such messages, in addition to stating regimental number, name, unit, etc., to bear the words "Canadians, France." These messages, however, even if paid for at full rates, are not necessarily forwarded by telegraph in the final stages of their stages to France, and may be subject to some delay.

The foregoing does not apply to messages which may be sent at the special non-minimum Week-end Letter rate to soldiers, sailors and nurses serving with the Canadian Expeditionary Force in France. Such messages, which should be fully addressed in all cases, are forwarded by post from England by the telegraph Company, and should not, therefore, be directed in care of the War Office, London.
