Letter From England

(Continued from page 1)

that night and went for a good long walk. We didn't go to George's, but stopped at the Y. M. C. A. at Shakespeare square. There were about 500 soldiers slept there. They only charged us 1s., 3d. for bed and breakfast. Next morning we went over to George's and then up to the Gallery. We took the underground railway from 'Charing Cross' to 'Mark Lane' and went over to London Tower. Soldiers in uniform get through for nothing. We went to the Central Tower and then up to Beauchamp Tower, where we bought those cards and then went down to the Bloody tower. We saw the only operating portcullis in the world. It had been built for ages and is still in working order, looking very queer with its wooden cog wheels. We went up and seen the cell where the two Princes were smothered, and where Sir Walter Raleigh spent twelve years of his imprisonment and wrote a great deal of his works. After that we seen the Royal Jewels, crowns, sceptres, and all the royal jewels, the Giltan jewels from Africa which are priceless, all the medals and badges of honor of the present day, which alone are worth counting over to see. The Armories were grand, all the first cannon, rifles, spears, helmets, armour, mail and everything that was used centuries ago, including the armour, mail, spears, etc., belonging to Henry VIII, the gun carriage of Ed. VII, many instruments of torture used years ago such as thumb screws, limb stretchers, blocks, which the head and arms are put between as was done to the old slaves. We saw the execution block and ax that was always used for that purpose. We also saw the Traitors Gate, through which all traitors are taken, there having been 75 or 100 taken through during this war.

We got back to George's about 3.00 o'clock and after having dinner went with him and the girls to Brixton Road and saw where the German zeppelin had dropped bombs. After tea they all accompanied us to the station, we getting back to Camp at 11.30. We were very tired after our trip but had a lovely time from start to finish.

Now I will say a few words about the present. When we arrived back we found that 35 of the boys had gone back to Canada, only one of the 123rd being in the bunch. Two or three hundred more are supposed to go in a few days, and the rest would go to France. But this has all been changed and just these 18 years old are going back to Canada, and as far as we know the rest will go to France, not to fight but as a Construction Batt., to build a railroad to the Somme front I believe.

I think we will be home before Xmas as the preparations being made against the Huns are sure to count this spring. All the men and officers who have their wives and families over here are going to be ordered to send them back I heard. This points to an early finish of the war as after the war is over all the boys they can muster will be needed to take us back. I will write again in a few days. Goodbye with love from

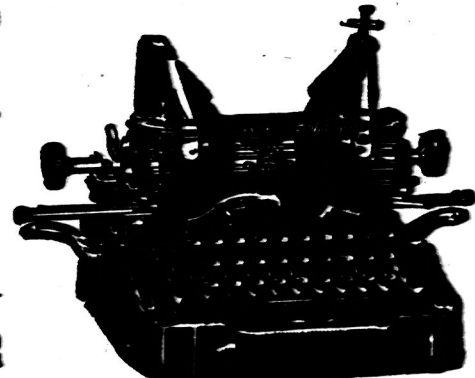
