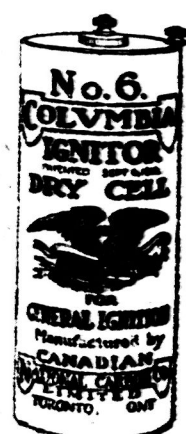

### Letter From England

Shornham, January 22nd, 1917  
Dear Mother and Father and all,  
Well I'm back to work again after having an excellent time. Allen Hasely and I left Camp on Jan. 14th about 5 o'clock in the afternoon. We stopped in Brantford all night, it is a great seaport and somewhat larger than Toronto and only miles from Camp. We went on to London Saturday morning and arrived at Victoria station about 11 o'clock. We then started to find our way to cousin George Marr's. We inquired at the station and a policeman put on the right bus, we got to Gilbert Road at twelve o'clock. When we got to the corner the street ran both ways and we did not know which way to go. We saw a lady on the lawn of one of the houses and thought we would ask her where we would find No. 15. She said "I suppose you are our cousin from Canada," I said yes, so we went in the house and got warm. We then took a car to the National Art Gallery where cousin George is Sergeant of the Police, in the Gallery. We found him and he greeted us warmly showed us around the gallery, where we saw some of the most expensive and grand pictures in the world.

I saw several of Landau's animal paintings, in fact his best, also the "Blind Beggar" not a copy but the original painting.

We then went home for dinner with George and visited all the afternoon. In the evening we went up to see his brother, Aleck Marr. He is a policeman and was on duty and seemed very nice. One thing that struck us was the food meal a day system, it is all right to us. On Sunday we got up at 9 o'clock and went up to the gallery, had a talk with George and then took tube to Mark Lane from Charing Cross by underground. The underground system is great. They are about 40 or 50 feet down. The moving stair is very exciting to ride on the first time. We got out at Mark Lane, had a walk around the outside of the tower and over Tower Bridge then we took a car to Petticoat Lane. It is something like a market only narrow and crowded on both sides with Jew stands. They sell everything. Allen and I bought some oranges, I put mine in my pocket when I felt something brush my side. I turned quickly and saw an old woman putting my orange in a hand bag. We laughed and she beat it in a hurry.

We then went back to Trafalgar Square just in time to catch George coming out of the Art Gallery. He took us for a walk by Queen Victoria's memorial and Westminster Abbey, then back up and through the Horse guards. They are a grand sight. We went home and had dinner. We then went to Aleck Marr's for tea and had a splendid time. We got back to George's, 11 o'clock had tea again and went to bed. It was a lovely bed, what they call an old Lincolnshire goose feather bed. Allen and I jumped in and never found ourselves until 9 o'clock next morning, then we rushed to Kings Cross station. We left on the 9.45 train for Hellingham and got as far as Grantham by 11 o'clock where we had to wait until 3.30 p.m. We went up town and bought our dinner and then walked around the town. I sent you some cards telling about this town and I have some snaps from my camera that I will send you after awhile. We missed the 3.50 train and had to wait until 6.50, got to Hellingham at 7.30. We hired a horse and cart and were driven to Hellingham to Mr. Gills, a distance of 3 1/2 miles. We arrived at 9 o'clock and were received very warmly by all the family. They have one boy at home my age and a girl of 15 years. They live on a farm, the buildings are all brick. We stayed there until Wednesday noon. We got back to London about 7 o'clock (Continued on page 5)
