They treated us to-day just as good as if we had been in Canada, we had a real Xmas dinner. Our hut is fixed up in great shape, trimming all over it. These few boys are a credit to your County, and these are the words used by the C.O., "that we were the finest lot of lads that has entered the camp."

Well, by the time you receive this note, I'll be in France, as I go over with the next draft on Dec. 27th, I remain, one of the Sandusk Boys.

## Haldimand Recruiting League

The Executive Committee of the Haldimand Recruiting League held a very successful and effective business meeting at the Court House, Cayuga, on Tuesday last, Jan. 9th, commencing at 2 p.m.

Those present were—Robert Bennett, Dunnville, President; Colonel Williams, Chief Recruiting Officer for Military District Toronto, Lieut. Colonel Healey Snyder, Commanding the 215th Battalion, C. E. F., Brantford; Lieut. Cotterell, 215th Batt., Brantford; J. W. Sheppard, Secretary and Treasurer of the League, Cayuga; Dr. W. Jaques, M. P. P., I. W. Holmes, Warden of Haldimand County, Reeve R. W. Smith, and James Noble, Esq., all of Jarvis; John Senn, Esq., Oneida; N. H. Wickett, Esq., and John A. Turnbull, Seneca; W. M. Thompson, J. P., Canfield; J. J. Parsons, Esq., Walpole; J. C. Ingles, Hagersville.

A general discussion was held with a view to formulating a plan to secure 250 men for the 215th Battalion from the County of Haldimand, that being the quota required from this county. The reports of the eligible men in the county as reported from the various municipalities, were examined and some 3000 names were found on the lists of young men of military age physical condition.

It was resolved that the County be divided into two districts to be known as the East and West districts of Haldimand for Recruiting purposes to be composed of the following municipalities and committees.

For the West District

COMPRISING the Municipalities of—Caledonia, Hagersville, Jarvis, Oneida, Rainham Centre, Seneca and Walpole.

COMMITTEE—Dr. Wm. Jaques, M. P. P., Chairman, J. J. Parsons, J. C. Ingles, Ivan W. Holmes, R. W. Smith, James Noble.

For the East District

COMPRISING the Municipalities of—Cayuga, Canboro, North Cayuga, South Cayuga, Dunnville, Dunn, Moulton and Sherbrooke.

COMMITTEE—Robert Bennett, Chairman, Thos. Marshall, M. P. P., F. R. Lalor, M. P., J. N. Paget, J. P., Roland Secord and J. W. Sheppard, with power to add to their numbers.

Lieut. Col. Snider on being invited to attend the committee stated that the report in the local press that had been brought to his notice, was not official that the 215th Battalion had orders to be ready to move by the middle of the month, that no such orders had been received, and that in all probability the Battalion would be training at Brantford during the winter and not leave until it had reached full strength. The number on the roll was 523 and a total of 1117 was required. Lieut. Cotterell will be located in Dunnville, two in Hagersville, one in Cayuga, Caledonia and Jarvis for recruiting purposes, and that himself, Major Sweet and Captain Jackson, and Capt. McKegney would visit these places occasionally to stimulate recruiting and would be available for training, and that all go to Brantford for a time for training, and that all men enlisting in Haldimand would form a Haldimand County Company in the Battalion.

The appointment of a Military Service Investigation Board was discussed and it was decided that one was necessary to pass upon a certificate showing that the applicant had applied for Military Service and for the reasons therein set forth had been declared to be exempt.

The Board was appointed as follows:—His Honour Judge Hopkins, Chairman, Rev. McKinnon, Caledonia, John Senn, Oneida, David Hastings, P. M., Dunnville, J. C. Ingles, Hagersville, and J. W. Sheppard, Cayuga, Secretary.

The Secretary of the League was authorized to purchase 500 buttons and certificates.

The following Committee was appointed to wait upon the County Council on January 23rd to arrange for the payment of the unavoidable necessary expenses that may be incurred in this the last recruiting campaign for voluntary enlistment in this county.

COMMITTEE—Dr. Jaques, W. M. Thompson, John Senn, I. W. Holmes, J. J. Parsons, Robt. Bennett and J. W. Sheppard.

Resolved unanimously that all personal services of members of the League in recruiting be given free and that the only actual expenses for printing bills, circulars, livery, postage and stationary, supplies and actual travelling expenses be paid.

The League then adjourned to the call of the President.
