No invitations were issued but a number of the bride's friends came to the church to witness the ceremony. The bride entered the church on the arm of her mother, who gave her away. The groom was unattended, Miss Myrtle Porter performing the duties of maid of honor. The bride was charmingly attired in a suit of battleship grey chiffon tulle, with maize satin blouse, and hat of old rose and battleship grey. Worthy of note was the blouse, which was a gift to his daughter from the late Mr. Hawthorne, brought by him from Paris, France. Her flowers took the form of a corsage bouquet of pink Kilmarnock roses.
