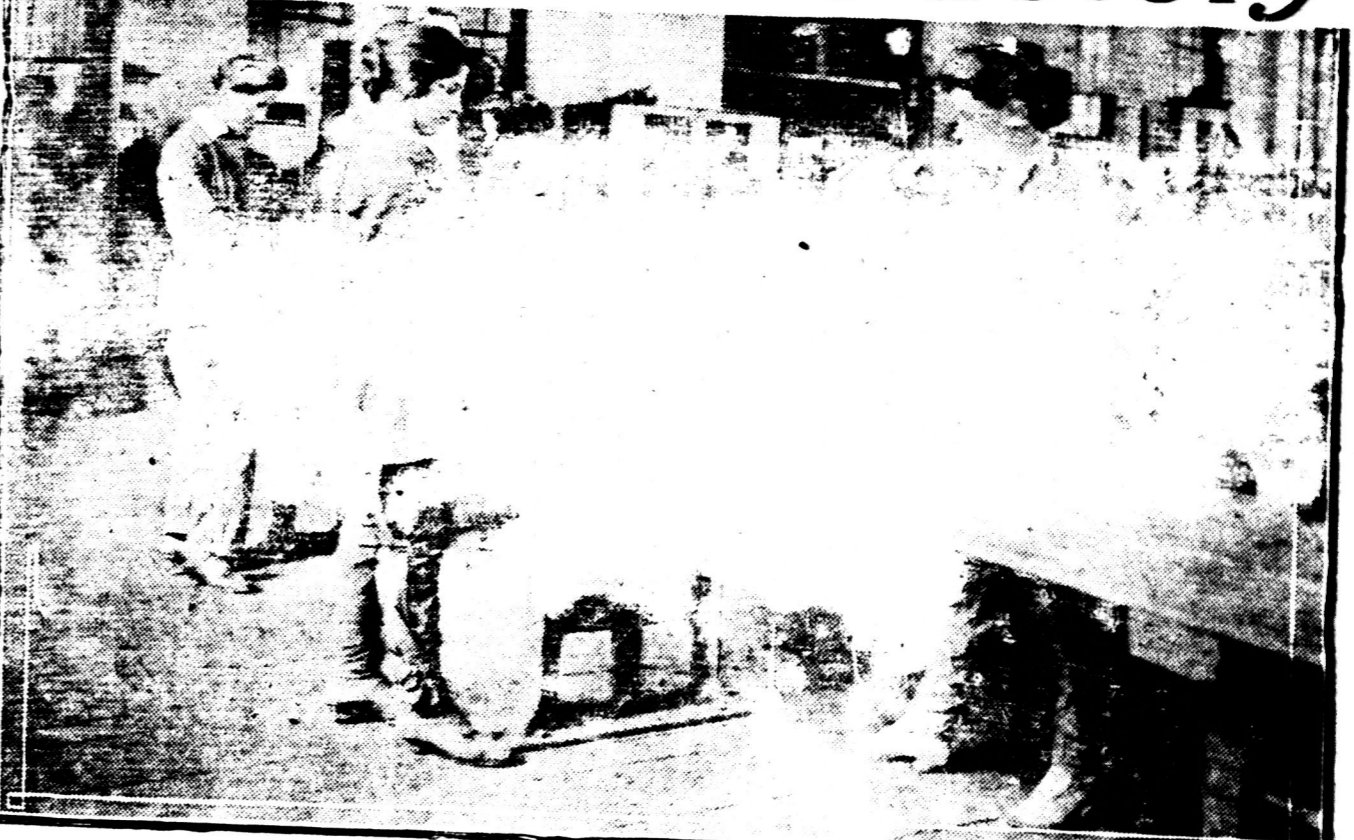

The women of England are making munitions and replacing those at the front in almost every kind of trade, and it is nowadays considered to be about the times for the women of Canada to do a similar work and their little bit to help the country in times of need.

A shortage of man labor has given the women every opportunity, and they have risen to the occasion. In the C. P. R. Angus Shops at Montreal the women have been first with the ambition of emulating their sisters in England who are now wearing overalls just like men, and now they also "wear the breeches."
