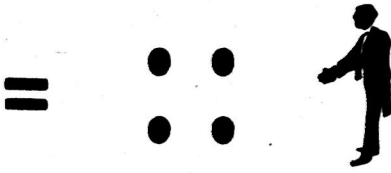

## Letter from Eric Geere

France,

June 15, 1915.

Dear Martha:  
Received your most welcome letter a couple of days ago and was as usual glad to hear from you. It was the first mail I have got from Canada for a month. I received a letter and a box from Cayuga at time so I was not so bad off. Oh, about Bert Williamson, he got through Vimy Ridge alright but just after he got blood poisoning in his hand and he went to the hospital and now he is back in England. I wrote to Maloney and told him to write. He is on a pretty steady job, I guess, and it keeps him going all the time. I went over to see him about a couple of weeks ago but he had just gone away. Yes I heard A. G. was wounded, he is in the 7th Batt., and Bruce is in a Machine Gun Company. Yes, Bill Griffey and Fred Pettit are in this battalion, but not in the same company. Nick Porter is in the 4th batt. I can just imagine what a good time you will give me but that is something I have to look forward to. You know sometimes the Jarvis boys all get together and talk over the times we have had in good old Jarvis, and the good times we will have if we get back safely which I hope we will, I will certainly have to practice up on that speak all right. You certainly have quite a stock to look after. Wish I was back helping you feed them and to hear about them go darn ducks being on the back stoop. Living is getting pretty high is it? So you are going to feed us on beans. That was funny about me being reported wounded, that's the first time I ever heard anything about it. Oh, the Canadian girls are good enough for me. These English girls are all right, but they aren't in it with our Canadian girls. Remember me to Aunt Sarah and the McNeils and Mrs. Jones, who, I suppose, will be with you by the time this reaches you. Well, I think this is all at present, or at least all you people will want to read of this scribbling. Tell Mrs. Abraham I will write her later. With love and best regards to all, I remain

On July 21st will be held the National Celebrations of Belgium. There will be three years that the resistance of Belgians has permitted France and England organize, to prepare the victory. Belgium made the sacrifice by herself! But, by her bravery, what numerous things has she been obliged to endure. Thanks to the help of the Allies and to the generous sympathy of the World, she has all surmounted.
