Good Friday, 1917. Sitting in a German dugout this day of hallowed memories. I am reminded that District meeting is near and therefore must report. Since leaving Canada I being torn from the home battalion; but day 1.75 is "any arm of the service."

This is the fifth battalion I have been in and the changes have all been sud- The pair \$7c. den. I have been in France some two months, here and there. The mud conditions were terrible at first, some of the journeys were tedious.
