Letter from France

scribed the names of their own dead on the tomb. No wonder some French came the other day and destroyed the monuments. A saw-bayonet hangs here in the dugout. In many places the fruit trees have either been cut down or ringed.

For two years they must have lived underground, such tunnels, such dugouts, and yet for miles and miles every foot of ground has been torn by our shells. What a battlefield! There where the lines met—No Man's Land—huge craters, tangled mass of barbed wire, and the dead. The sight was terrible. Oh, what a toll of human life—men in all postures as death came to them, so they fell—British, French and foe. I am burning a candle that I found in a dead German's pocket. In their retreat they lost heavily.

The more I see of the war—I loathe it, I hate it—and yet I count it an honour to be here, and I do want to bear some of this world's greatest suffering. Nothing will ever efface from memory the picture of the slain upon this battlefield. It might have been and yet may be me. Men who loved to live, there they lie, because the Kaiser wanted to rule and enslave all mankind. I sometimes wonder if the French can ever forgive. My heart tells me Germany is a defeated foe, and death follows in their tracks.

Witnessed aeroplane fight the other night and Fritz came down in flames.

We expect to shift in a few days again. We don't see any Canadians as we are attached to an Imperial Division.

There is no Sunday here. I have not seen a Methodist chaplain since leaving Canada. For the present the one great task is "win the war." Sometimes I get terribly discouraged, and then again things look bright and we seem to see peace in sight. There is plenty of sin and wickedness lower down the line, but the ideals with me when I enlisted are with me still, and I have seen no sin bigger or more appealing enough to lead me into other paths. Of course, the life is all so different, and yet anywhere and everywhere, one is conscious of the Divine Presence. I think of nothing but seeing this thing through and hope to be back in Canada, ready to take a charge, a year from this coming July.

There is much more that I might write—the roaring of those guns—well, some day they will cease. For the present my address is Sergeant G. T. Shields, No. 739728, 2nd Canadian Labor Bn., B.E.F., France. This will always find me no matter what changes may come. I am sorry that I did not write sooner; I fear that you will not get this in time for District. Nails here are very uncertain.


