

scribed the names of their own dead on the tombs. No wonder some French came the other day and destroyed the momements. A saw-bayonet hangs here in the dugout. In many places the fruit trees have either been cut down or ringed.

For two years they must have lived un- 470 derground, such tunnels, such dugouts, and yet for miles and miles every foot of ground has been torn by our shells. What a battlefield! There where the lines met 20c each. -No Man's Land-huge craters, tangled mass of barbed wire, and the dead. The sight was terrible. Oh, what a toll of human life-men in all postures as death' came to them, so they fell-British, French and foe. I am burning a candle that I found in a dead German's pocket. In their retreat they lost heavily.


